

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

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Self Drive TOURING ROUTES

The largest range of extraordinary self drive touring routes in WA

Australia's Golden Outback has a fascinating range of self drive touring routes offering vast horizons and clear blue skies. Travel through historical areas and to extraordinary natural attractions.



Sealed Roads: Grey headings on the following drives indicate these routes that are predominantly on sealed roads and therefore can be undertaken in normal 2WD rental or private vehicles.



Unsealed Roads: Brown headings indicate self drive routes that are predominantly on unsealed roads and therefore more suitable for 4WD's with high clearance. Hire vehicles driven on unsealed roads need to be 4WD's.



Wildflowers in Spring: This wildflower symbol on the headings indicates these routes burst into bloom during the springtime wildflower season.

2 DAY PIONEERS' PATHWAY

Follow the dream of early farming and gold mining pioneers who journeyed east into the Wheatbelt in search of fortunes from life on the land.



2 DAY ESPERANCE ESCAPE

Escape to the pure white beaches of Esperance and experience some of the state's most picturesque farmland and historic towns.



2 DAY GOLDEN PIPELINE HERITAGE TRAIL

Hit the road to adventure and the wild west on a journey along the Golden Pipeline Heritage Trail from Perth to Kalgoorlie.



Day 1:
Perth to Dowerin
160km, 2 hours

Leave the hustle of the city behind and escape through the hills to the pretty farming town of Toodyay. Valley views and a patchwork of farmland make this a scenic stop for lunch at one of the local pubs or riverside picnic spots.

Continue north east to Goomalling, crossing the Avon River tributary at Mortlock River – a well known wildflower stop during spring.

The Tin Dog sculpture welcomes you to Dowerin. Take the walk trail to see local wildlife before checking into one of the hotels and motels in town.

Day 2:
Dowerin to Merredin
155km, 2 hours

The drive from Dowerin to Merredin winds through farmland, bush reserves and springtime wildflowers.

Enjoy a pub lunch at Wyalkatchem and a visit to the local museum before heading through Nungarin and Trayning to the heart of the Wheatbelt, Merredin. See the biggest grain storage facility in the country and learn more about the way of life on the land in this friendly community. For accommodation, choose from hotels, motels, B&B's or caravan park.



Day 1:
Perth to Lake Grace
350km, 4 hours

Slicing through WA's southern regions, take in the green fields and a patchwork of farmland as you head to Williams and on to Arthur River. Stop for lunch in this friendly town known for farming heritage and scenic riverside picnic spots. In the afternoon, journey through the heart of sheep farming territory to Kukerin or Lake Grace. Along the way you'll see Wagin's Giant Ram and Museum Village, Lake Dumbleyung, the town of Kukerin and also stop in at Cambinata Yabbie Farm. Stay overnight in Mary's Cottages in Kukerin or at Lake Grace's hotel, motel or caravan park.

Day 2:
Lake Grace to Esperance
370km, 4 hours

In the morning visit the Australian Inland Mission Hospital – a museum showcasing the work of the Royal Flying Doctor Service. Take in the views across massive Lake Grace before heading to Lake King. The drive is studded with salt lakes, wildflowers and bushland. Visit the historic mining town of Ravensthorpe, and stop for a swim at Munglinup before arriving in Esperance. There is plenty of accommodation to choose from here. Stay a while and explore superb national parks and secluded white sandy beaches.



Day 1:
Perth to Merredin
260km, 3 hours

From Mundaring follow the route of the historic water pipeline, built more than 100 years ago – and still the longest fresh water pipeline on earth.

Enjoy scenic farmscapes and nature walks, and explore historic water pump stations and lookouts during the journey to Merredin.

Stay overnight at a motel or hotel in this friendly farming community where you'll also find seasonal wildflowers and warm hospitality.

Day 2:
Merredin to Kalgoorlie
340km, 3.5 hours

Head east to the Goldfields, stopping at Southern Cross where gold was first discovered in the late 1800s.

On the way to Coolgardie and Kalgoorlie-Boulder, you'll see gold rush ruins, interpretive displays and stunning springtime wildflowers.

Spend the night or a few days in Kalgoorlie, the hub of WA's gold mining industry with plenty of historic tales, magnificent architecture and lively nightlife.



3 DAY MONSIGNOR HAWES TRAIL

Learn about WA's religious architecture taking in New Norcia and the eclectic designs of Monsignor Hawes - best known for creating Catholic churches throughout the region.



Day 1: Perth to New Norcia 130km, 2 hours

Head off through springtime wildflowers to New Norcia, Australia's only monastic town. This peaceful place is home to a community of Benedictine monks and famous for its Spanish architecture and collection of religious art works – not to mention gourmet breads and olive oil. Check out the Museum and Art Gallery, take a walking tour and enjoy a cooling drink on the wide verandah of the New Norcia Hotel. Stay overnight in the hotel, or check into the quiet retreat of Monastery Guesthouse.

Day 2: New Norcia to Morawa 370km, 4 hours

This morning, join the monks in prayer before heading north to Moora, stopping to take in local heritage architecture on the Town Walk. Wildflowers colour the drive to Carnamah during spring. Enjoy lunch here before arriving in Perenjori to see the Monsignor Hawes-designed Church of Saint Joseph and check out the Peoples Pathway, with 22 cut out panels. This church is typical of the Monsignors style. Perenjori is also home to the famous and unique Wreath Leschenaultia which appears during September and October.

Continue to Morawa and visit the Church of the Holy Cross, also designed by Monsignor Hawes. Accommodation is available at the local hotel/motel, caravan park and farm stays.

Day 3: Morawa to Geraldton 350km, 4 hours

Drive north to historic Yalgoo, with its well-preserved colonial architecture and rich gold mining heritage. Spend time exploring the museum, Court House and Dominican Chapel of St Hyacinth, designed by Monsignor Hawes.

From Yalgoo, head west towards the coast, stopping at Mullewa's beautiful Monsignor Hawes church. Continue to Geraldton, where Monsignor Hawes was a pioneer priest and architect in the diocese between the wars. One of his most important buildings is located in the port city – the St Francis Xavier Cathedral, which was built in a style known as California Mission.

* Overnight stopping locations are suggestions only, please feel free to plan your own exciting itinerary.

3 DAY NORTHERN WHEATBELT WONDERS

Meander north of Perth and experience a perfect northern Wheatbelt wildflower and nature getaway.



Day 1: Perth to Wongan via Calingiri 183km, 2.5 hours

Leave Perth and head for Wongan Hills. On the way why not check out the walks and local produce in Chittering and the Bindoon Bakery. Call in to Rica Erickson and Old Plains Road reserves on the way to Calingiri then explore Lake Ninan. Wongan Hills has various nature reserves with an abundance of wildflowers and fauna as well as walk trails, a museum and other sites to be explored. Stay overnight in the local hotel, guest house or caravan park.

Day 2: Wongan Hills to Moora via Dalwallinu 165km, 2 hours

Head north to Dalwallinu where Wreath Leschenaultia blooms in several sites just out of town. Visit Dalwallinu Discovery Centre for information on attractions and wildflowers in season. Head south to Moora where the town clock and splendid murals welcome you. Stay overnight in the local hotel, motel, B&B's or caravan park.


Day 3: Moora to Perth via New Norcia 171km, 2.5 hours

Morning short walk along Carnaby Cockatoo Interpretive Walk Trail. Spot one of magnificent birds and discover the flora and fauna of area. Before heading back to Perth experience the Western Wildflower Farm at Coomberdale (20 km north), where you can take a tour to see, touch and smell wildflowers, or on the way back visit New Norcia, Australia's own monastic town.



3 DAY PATHWAYS TO WAVE ROCK

Visit one of Australia's best known natural icons Wave Rock, on this three-day trip exploring the changing landscape and charming farming communities.



Day 1: Perth to Hyden (Wave Rock) 340km, 4 hours

Head east from Perth, through picturesque farmland to Corrigin (famous for its Dog in a Ute and Dog Cemetery!). At Karlgarin visit Tressie's Museum & Caravan Park with display of olden day memorabilia and gramophones. Enjoy lunch at one of the local restaurants or cafes before taking the short drive to Wave Rock. This 15 metre high, 110 metre long granite cliff is shaped remarkably like a wave. Scientists believe it has taken more than 2.7 billion years of weather, water and chemical erosion to create.

In the afternoon visit natural attractions of Hippo's Yawn and Mulka's Cave – home to Aboriginal art. Stay overnight at one of the local motels, cottages, caravan park or backpacker hostel.

Day 2: Hyden to Bruce Rock 305km, 3.5 hours

Head south to Lake Grace with its winery, salt lakes and historic Inland Mission Hospital. Perhaps travel to Kokerbin to visit Caminata Yabbies before heading onto Kulin, popular for its annual Bush Races. You can't miss the Tin Horse Highway – a series of brightly coloured tin horses which welcome visitors to town.

Travel north to the sheep and wheat farming community of Kondinin. Take in 360° views of the surrounding land from Yeerakine Rock before continuing to Bruce Rock. Visit the local museum and Australia's smallest bank at nearby Shackleton.

The 45 minute drive west to Kokerbin Rock offers spectacular views of the surrounding countryside. Stay overnight at the motel, caravan park or hotel and enjoy a pub meal and warm hospitality.

Day 3: Bruce Rock to Perth 250km, 2.5 hours


Take a leisurely drive through farm pastures to the historic town of York in time for lunch at one of the colonial-style hotels. This place oozes history – enjoy a town walk before making the journey back to Perth.

3 DAY WINERY, WOODLANDS AND WHEATBELT TRAIL

Drive through picturesque farmland to Wheatbelt wineries, take superb nature walks and view local nocturnal wildlife and granite outcrops. This self drive is the perfect escape from the everyday.



Day 1:
Perth to Narrogin, via Wandering, Pingelly and Wickepin
267km, 3 hours

Head south down Albany Highway then turn off to explore the surprising Wheatbelt wineries around Wandering. Perhaps take a leisurely lunch at Tanglefoot then cut across to historical Pingelly perhaps with a drive to Boyagin Rock or Tutanning Reserve one of the richest conservation areas in WA (not suitable for vans).

Drive 57kms to Wickepin and explore Albert Facey's Homestead and wander the Yarling Brook heritage walk then make your way to Harrismith with its wide variety of wildflowers in season.

Depart Harrismith and travel 68kms via Taarblin Nature Reserve to Narrogin. Overnight in a local hotel, motel, B&B, farmstay or caravan park but this evening be sure to head out to Barna Mia for a nocturnal tour, bookings a must.

Day 2:
Narrogin to Wagin
49km, ½ hour

Today explore Narrogin with its heritage streetscapes and pretty gardens, wander Narrogin's Railway Dam or Gnarojin Park then walk the wildflower trail at Foxes Lair or perhaps take in Lake Toolibin home to the endangered freckled duck. Visit Donderry Wines or if you feel energetic climb Yilliminning or Birdwhistle Rock before driving some 50km south to the merino sheep farming centre of Wagin. The Giant Ram welcomes you to town – the biggest in the southern hemisphere. Stay overnight in a local hotel, motel or caravan park.


Day 3:
Wagin to Perth, via Arthur River & Williams. 236km, 2.5 hours

This morning take in the Wagin Historical Village for an up close view of the town's pioneering past then drive the 30km to Arthur River with its unique 'Rarebits on Burrowes' shop. In season beautiful wildflowers bloom at Boronia Reserve. Drive north to Williams with its 1km Heritage Trail walk and The Williams Woolshed, displaying a fine range of woollen garments, local wines and have a coffee at The Shed Café. Explore the history of the wool industry in The Shearer's Yarn.

Leaving Williams, head towards Perth and take in the Williams Nature Reserve located 10km northwest of the town before completing this itinerary back in 'the city'.

3 DAY WILDFLOWER WAY

Come drive this newly developed wildflower trail from Dalwallinu through the stunning Northern Wheatbelt, finishing in coastal Geraldton. Each spring this country bursts into bloom with 'carpets' of everlasting to through to the unique wreath flower.



Day 1:
Perth to Dalwallinu
251km, 3 hours

Depart Perth and head north through the Swan Valley, then up the Great Northern Highway to New Norcia, a Benedictine Monastery town. Along the way make sure you stop at the Bindoon Bakery for morning tea. After sightseeing New Norcia, travel through wide open vistas to the delightful town of Dalwallinu, home of wheat and wattle. This afternoon call into the Dalwallinu Discovery Centre for updates on local wildflower locations. Stay overnight in the local hotel, motel, caravan park or B&B.

Day 2:
Dalwallinu to Morawa
149km, 2 hours


Today head further north and inspect nearly half of the 21 interpretive sites along the Wildflower Way. Visit locations such as Wubin, Buntine Rock, Latham and Caron Dam before calling into the Wheatbelt town of Perenjori, which has so much to see and do in the area. Perhaps then continue onto the town of Morawa for your overnight accommodation. Stay in the local hotel, motel, caravan park or farmstays.

Day 3:
Morawa to Geraldton
197km, 2.5 hours

This is the final day on the Wildflower Way. Inspect some 11 interpretive sites before your arrival in Geraldton. Along the way stop in the town of Mullewa and call into the local Visitor Centre. Also take the 600m walk through the legacy of Monsignor John Hawes. This afternoon, drive the 100kms to Geraldton stopping at the remaining 4 interpretive sites. Large range of Geraldton accommodation available, hotels, motels and caravan parks. More information on the Wildflower Way can be found at www.wildflowercountry.com.au

4 DAY WHEATBELT WAY

The brand new Wheatbelt Way is a fascinating experience starting in Dowerin and spanning 800 kilometres with 24 interpretive sites. Extra information can be found at www.wheatbeltway.com.au



Day 1:
Perth to Wyalkatchem
214km, 3 hours

Depart Perth and head to Dowerin then join the brand new Wheatbelt Way. Make sure you pat Rusty the tin dog, the first site on this route. Head to Minnivale and Naaning Well, then Wyalkatchem to see Korrellocking Reserve and Wyalkatchem Well. Stay overnight in a hotel, B&B, caravan park or camping.

Day 2:
Wyalkatchem to Beringbooding
252km, 3.5 hours

Head north through the towns of Koorda, Bencubbin and Beacon, inspecting sites that include Koorda Native Flora Reserve, Pergande Sheep Yards and Marshall and Billburning Rock. From Beacon head due-east past other fascinating rock formations such as Beringbooding and Elachbutting. Stay overnight in a B&B, caravan park or free camp site.

Day 3:
Beringbooding to Mukinbudin
210km, 3 hours

Today head south to historic Westonia and visit Sandford Rocks and Boodalin Soak. Head to Mukinbudin visiting Weira Gnamma Hole and Wattoning historical site. Stay overnight in a hotel, caravan park or free camp site.

Day 4:
Mukinbudin to Perth
323km, 4 hours


Final day on the Wheatbelt Way. Visit site 20, Mangowine Homestead, a beautiful historic building built in 1876 and filled with antiques and memorabilia. Travel on to see other historic gnamma holes and wells and the Yelbeni Townsite Museum before travelling back to Dowerin and overnighting, or heading the 167km back to Perth.

2 DAY STEEL RIVER RUN

The Golden Pipeline bringing water to Kalgoorlie is one of the world's great engineering feats. Spend 2 days exploring this part of CY O'Connor's water scheme. Some dirt road, but suitable for 2WD.



Day 1:
Kalgoorlie/Coolgardie/Karalee Rocks
174km, 2 hours

Drive from Kalgoorlie via Jack Carin's Camp to Coolgardie where a range of fascinating sites will keep you a while – Warden Finnelly's, the Coolgardie Museum and the cemetery to name a few.


From here the Great Eastern Highway takes you through Bullabulling and on to No 8 steam pump station, the last in line on CYO'Connor's Golden Pipeline.

Travel further along the pipeline heading west to Karalee Rocks.

Karalee Rocks is famous for the historic Karalee Flume and water catchment area. This is a beautiful spot to camp under the trees or overnight in your caravan or motorhome.

Day 2:
Karalee Rocks to Kalgoorlie
174km, 2 hours

In the morning take the walk trails around Karalee Rocks before departing. Head to visit the site of No 7 Pump Station before returning to Kalgoorlie to visit Mount Charlotte, the end of the line for the water from Mundaring.

2 DAY EYRE HIGHWAY & NULLARBOR LINKS

This is one of Australia's great road adventures! Crossing the country from the east to west, through the vast arid interior and along the Great Australian Bight, the Nullarbor Plain is the ultimate outback adventure.



Day 1:
Eucla to Balladonia
500km, 5.5 hours

The Nullarbor Plain is the world's biggest single piece of limestone at 200,000 km². Make your way west across this amazing feat of nature – driving from Eucla near the border between South Australia and Western Australia along the Eyre Highway. At Eucla take the 3km detour to the beach then descend and travel the scenic lower plain via Mundrabilla to Madura Roadhouse and its lookout over the surrounding tablelands. Perhaps drive to Eyre Bird Observatory (4WD only). This area is home to more than 240 species of birds, many of which are rare and endangered.

Stop for lunch and play a hole at Cocklebidy, famous for its cave systems. You'll find a roadhouse, golf hole and fuel stop at Caiguna before hitting the longest straight stretch of road in the world – all 146.6 kilometres of it! Its common name is the 90 Mile Straight. After this spectacular drive you've earned a restful night at the Balladonia Roadhouse.

Day 2:
Balladonia to Kalgoorlie
380km, 4 hours

This morning play a hole, check out the local museum, home to the remnants of Skylab, a former space station that crashed to earth near Balladonia in 1979. The journey continues through low shrub and make sure you play the 'Sheep's Back' at Fraser Range before arriving in Norseman – the first major town on the WA side of the Nullarbor Plain and the end of the Eyre Highway. Stop for a picnic lunch at Beacon Hill Lookout, which provides views of the town, surrounding countryside and salt lakes. Drive either north to the gold mining hub of Kalgoorlie and then continue to Perth, or head south to Esperance and return to Perth via the Great South West Edge.



11 DAY THE GREAT SOUTH WEST EDGE

Drive one of Australia's 16 most fascinating landscapes, between Busselton and Esperance. This unique region comprises Margaret River wineries/caves, South West forests and Tree Top Walk, historic coastal towns and many picturesque National Parks.



Day 1-3:
Perth/Busselton/Margaret River
277km, 3 hours

Leave Perth heading south through coastal Bunbury and Busselton, to famous Margaret River. Base yourself here for 3 nights exploring wineries, coastal scenery, beaches, caves and wonderful local townships.

Day 4:
Margaret River/Pemberton 143km, 2 hours

Leave Margaret River and head to Pemberton, home of the giant Karri forests and an emerging wine producing area. Make time to visit the Warren National Park.

Days 5-6:
Pemberton/Albany 239km, 4 hours

Depart Pemberton and head south via the Shannon, D'entrecasteaux and Walpole-Nornalup N. Parks. Be sure to take The Tree Top Walk near Walpole. Wander picturesque Denmark before arriving in Albany, staying 2 nights. Spend the second day exploring Albany and its many natural coastal attractions.

Day 7:
Albany/Hopetoun 352km, 4 hours

Travel from Albany via the Porongurup and Stirling N. Parks to the coastal town of Hopetoun, located near Fitzgerald River N Park. Overnight in a local caravan park or motel.

Days 8-9:
Hopetoun/Esperance 193km, 2.5 hours

Enter the Fitzgerald River N. Park and drive along the new scenic coastal roads with wonderful interpretive sites. Travel east to beautiful Esperance located on a Bay of Islands. Stay two nights and make the 45 minute drive to Cape Le Grand N. Park with the kangaroos on Australia's whitest beach at Lucky Bay. On the way call in and see Esperance Stonehenge.

Day 10:
Esperance/Wave Rock 382km, 4 hours

Depart Esperance and head north to Hyden and the amazing 2.4 billion year old Wave Rock and other attractions in the area like Mulka's Cave with ancient Aboriginal hand stencil art. Overnight in the motel or caravan park.

Day 11:
Wave Rock/Kulin/Perth 391km, 4.5 hours

Depart Wave Rock and head to Kulin via The Tin Horse Highway with its funny horse based figures all placed alongside farmers fences. From here head to the historic town of York in the Darling Ranges, wander the historic streetscape before heading into Perth.

The World's Longest Golf Course



This unique 18-hole par-72 golf course spans 1,365 kilometres with one hole in each participating town or roadhouse along the Eyre Highway from Kalgoorlie in Western Australia to Ceduna in South Australia. Each hole includes a synthetic green, tee and somewhat rugged outback-style natural terrain fairway. The course provides visitors with a quintessential Australian golfing experience that is unmatched anywhere in the world.

Nullarbor Links takes you on a drive to Australia's famous oyster beds at Ceduna, the wheat and sheep farming districts

at Penong and Nundroo. You venture past migrating whales and beautiful coastline at Nullarbor, to arrive at the beaches at Eucla. See "Skylab" at Balladonia and the working sheep station at Fraser Range. The indigenous art and dance of Ngadju people in Norseman features strongly in National and International appeal. Nickel mining and land sailing at Kambalda and then finally arriving at Australia's gold capital, Kalgoorlie.

2 DAY GRANITE WOODLANDS & DISCOVERY TRAIL

Linking Hyden (Wave Rock) to Norseman, explore pristine landscape – home to one of the world's greatest untouched temperate woodlands, with 16 designated stopping places.



Day 1: Hyden to the Breakaways Campsite 137km, 2-3 hours

Spend time at Wave Rock – this amazing feat of nature was millions of years in the making. Hit the dirt road east towards Norseman – much of the trail is gravel, but it is suitable for two-wheel drives and caravans. Take in the long views and springtime wildflowers as you pass across the Holland Track.

Sandy heathland gives way to nickel and gold mining land around Forrestania Plots. You know you're in the outback if you spot a bush turkey, dingo or some of the more elusive native animals like honey and pigmy possums, which are sometimes seen around Grevillea Hill. From here the landscape changes to mallee woodland and eucalypts.

Explore rocky outcrops and cliffs of The Breakaways. Roll out your swag at the campground here for a night spent under an amazing star-filled sky.

Day 2: The Breakaways Campsite to Norseman 165km, 2-3 hours

You'll see eucalypts, sandy heathlands, hakea and flame grevillea as you set off east towards Mermaid Rock. This is a great spot for a picnic, rest break, or a leg stretch along the walk trail.

Take in the vista at Lake Johnson and Lake Viewpoint. A spectacular open woodland of salmon gum trees awaits.

Continue to Disappointment Rock and walk the 2 kilometre trail around and over the outcrop. The next 40 kilometre stretch passes through an ever-changing landscape – from mallee woodland to mallee scrub, sandy shrub and stands of eucalypts.

Rolling rocky hills and abandoned mine shafts dot the landscape to Lake Cowan. The Woodlands Walk in Norseman completes the trail. Spend some time soaking up the mining heritage and exploring the salt lakes of Norseman.



3 DAY GOLDEN QUEST DISCOVERY TRAIL

For a true Aussie outback adventure, hit the road and discover ghost towns and rugged scenery, meet the local characters and hear tales of fortunes made and lost.



Day 1: Coolgardie to Kookynie 350km, 4 hours

The adventure begins in Coolgardie – visit gold rush museums before heading north east along the trail, passing through Ora Banda and Goongarrie to Menzies. Stop for lunch at the local hotel then drive to Lake Ballard and the remarkable Antony Gormley sculptures that rise from a remote salt lake at Snake Hill. Continue north, stopping at Niagara Dam before arriving in Kookynie, where you could try your hand at fossicking for gold. You'll find the local population of just 13, who you're likely to meet at the Grand Hotel, have plenty of yarns to tell! Stay at the hotel or there's also a caravan park.

Day 2: Kookynie to Leonora 67km, 1 hour

For a real adventure immerse yourself in the outback and take the unsealed road to Leonora. Today's highlight is the ghost town of Gwalia. This rustic historic precinct oozes gold rush charm. Visit Gwalia Museum, site of historic Hoover House, once home to the former American President, Herbert Hoover, who managed the local mine. Visitors can stay overnight in this restored residence, or continue to Leonora where there are hotels, motels and backpacker accommodation.


Day 3: Leonora to Kalgoorlie-Boulder 235km, 2.5 hours

Take the western trail through stunning outback landscapes and seasonal wildflowers to the mining hub of Kalgoorlie-Boulder. Be sure to stock up on fuel and food supplies before setting off into the Aussie outback. After a day on the road you've earned a cold drink on the wide verandah of one of the many hotels in Kalgoorlie-Boulder. Accommodation-wise you're spoilt for choice – hotels, resorts, motels, backpacker lodges and caravan parks are on offer.



3 DAY JOHN HOLLAND TRACK & WAY

Seize the spirit of adventure and head off along this 600km track, connecting Broomehill and Coolgardie. Carved out through rugged bushland by pioneer John Holland and his party, the track takes you deep into the Aussie outback.



Day 1: Broomehill to Newdegate 200km, 2.5 hours

For a dose of John Holland history, visit the museum at Broomehill before hitting the road towards the town of Nyabing.

You'll pass by Lake Grace, a shallow salt lake with a superb lookout over the surrounding countryside and springtime wildflowers.

Continue through rich farmland, taking in Holland Soak and Silver Wattle Hill before arriving in the town of Newdegate, known for its natural reserves and friendly hospitality.

Stay overnight at the Holland Track Farm which offers guided and camping tours.

Day 2: Newdegate to Breakaways Camping Area or Sandalwood Camp Approx 220km, 3-4 hours

Explore Emu Rock before crossing the Rabbit Proof Fence. If you're in a two-wheel drive, continue along the John Holland Way towards Coolgardie – stay overnight at the Breakaways Camping area.

For a real outback four-wheel adventure, there's the option of the Holland Track beginning in Hyden. This route slices through natural bushland and past stunning rock formations. Camp out under the stars at Sandalwood Camp.

Day 3: John Holland Way to Breakaways camping area to Coolgardie Approx 250km, 4-5 hours

or Holland Track to Sandalwood Camp to Coolgardie Approx 220km, 5-6 hours

Today we complete our epic journey through the remote outback – enjoy vistas of virgin bush, salt lakes, nature reserves and granite outcrops. The John Holland Way and the Holland Track meet up near Pigeon Hole Rock for the final leg to Coolgardie.

There's plenty of gold rush history and country style hospitality here – spend a few days exploring Coolgardie's rich mining heritage.

4 DAY MINERS PATHWAY

Capture the prospecting spirit on this trail through the Murchison's gold rush days. In the late 1800s towns like Mount Magnet, Cue, Meekatharra and Sandstone rocketed to the forefront of WA's gold boom!

Day 1: Paynes Find to Meekatharra 340km, 4 hours

Enjoy the bright bloom of springtime wildflowers before setting off from Paynes Find towards Mount Magnet. Remnants of Mount Magnet's gold mining history are evident in discarded mine shafts, museum and heritage walk trails – but you'll find the mining industry is still alive and well.

From here, head north to Cue, famous for its stunning colonial architecture. Many original buildings are classified by the National Trust and still used for their original purpose. Stay overnight in Meekatharra, known for its friendly hospitality, wildflowers, rocky outcrops and native wildlife.

Day 2: Meekatharra to Sandstone 221km, 2.5 hours

Hit the dirt road south east to Sandstone, keeping watch for local wildlife including kangaroos and emus. Natural rock formations contrast with the rust stained sandstone which gives the town its name. Stop at London Bridge, an ancient rock formation that was once wide enough to allow a horse and sulky to cross. Stay overnight in the National Hotel, built nearly 100 years ago, or check into the local caravan park.

Day 3: Sandstone to Yalgoo 280km, 3 hours

The journey weaves through the vast open landscape, crossing back through Mount Magnet to the town of Yalgoo. Native wildlife including emus, wedge-tailed eagles and kangaroos are plentiful around the town. Just south of Yalgoo is Joker's Tunnel, carved through solid rock by early prospectors – it's also a great spot to see wildflowers. Stay overnight at one of the nearby sheep stations offering accommodation, or check into the hotel, caravan park or campground in town.

Day 4: Yalgoo to Paynes Find 155km, 2 hours

Head south east across a dirt road to your starting point of Paynes Find. Make time to visit the Gold Battery and Museum, which showcases the region's mining, pastoral and sandalwood industries.



3 DAY KINGSFORD SMITH MAIL RUN

For a slice of Aussie outback history, jump into a four-wheel drive and trace the original overland mail run used in the 1920s from Carnarvon to Meekatharra – and celebrate the pioneering spirit of Australia's most famous pilot, Charles Kingsford Smith.

Day 1: Carnarvon to Mount Augustus 497km, 6 hours

From the historic port town of Carnarvon head east through pastoral land to Gascoyne Junction, where massive sheep stations dot the landscape.

Enjoy lunch at the Gascoyne Junction pub before setting off for Mount Augustus, a massive monocline twice the size of Uluru.

Arrive at Mount Augustus in time to watch the sun sink over the granite formation, thought to be 1,750 million years old. Don't miss a photo at sunset – Emu Hill Lookout is one of the best spots. Overnight accommodation at Mt Augustus Tourist Park or camp.

Day 2: Mount Augustus to Mount Gould 100km, 1.5 hours

This morning spend some time exploring the rock formations, caves and Aboriginal art scattered throughout the area. Wildflowers, birds and wildlife, swimming, fishing and picnic spots make this a true outback adventure destination.

Depart Mount Augustus, and watch it slowly disappear from the landscape as you head south for Gascoyne River at Landor.

Follow the current mail route via Mount Gould and the Mount Gould Lock Up. Find a spot along the way and pitch your tent for a night spent under a brilliant night sky.

Day 3: Mount Gould to Meekatharra 160km, 2 hours

Journey south through the vast, timeless landscape, to the gold mining town of Meekatharra. Spend time learning more about the town's mining past, as well as its indigenous heritage, on the Meeka Rangelands Discovery Walk Trail.

Rocky outcrops, native wildlife and wildflowers bring the town to life. Stay overnight in one of the hotels or the caravan park.



3 DAY WOOL WAGON PATHWAY

Offering the best of the Aussie outback and amazing marine adventures – this trail travels through some of WA's legendary sheep and wool country before heading to the coast. Expect star-filled night skies, vivid sunsets and lively country characters.

Day 1: Geraldton to Murchison Settlement 355km, 4 hours

Leave the bustling port city of Geraldton behind as you head east through the town of Pindar. Hit the red dirt road and journey through a timeless landscape to Murchison Settlement. This is the real Australian landscape – open space, historic homesteads and plenty of wildlife. Get a taste for life on the land by bunking down at a working sheep or cattle property – or stay at the settlement's roadhouse, caravan park or camp ground.

Day 2: Murchison Settlement to Gascoyne Junction 300km, 3 hours

Head north, stopping at the natural spring of Bilung Pool. Seashell fossils south of Gascoyne Junction point to the epic history of the natural landscape. Nestled on the banks of the Gascoyne River, the town is a centre for local sheep and wheat stations. A brand new Junction Pub and roadhouse has opened, an ideal place to overnight with bar, accommodation, caravan park & fuel available.

Day 3: Gascoyne Junction to Exmouth 611km, 7 hours

Take in the beauty of the Kennedy Ranges, which run north from Gascoyne Junction and boast springs, spectacular cliffs, canyons and wildlife. Continue north, deviating towards the coast and the town of Exmouth. Here, coastal breezes and stunning white beaches contrast against the rugged red earth.

Explore stunning Ningaloo Reef, and spend a few days here relaxing on the beach – or from late April to June go swimming with the biggest fish in the world, the whale shark.

CANNING Stock Route



Traversing the Gibson and Great Sandy Deserts, the Canning Stock Route is known for being the longest stock route in the world and the most challenging 4WD journey in Australia.

Stretching 2,013 kilometres (including side trips), the Canning Stock Route links Wiluna and Halls Creek and is an adventurer's delight as it takes you across a spectacular yet isolated landscape that is rich in pioneering history.

100 YEARS OF HISTORY

The route was surveyed by Albert Canning in 1906 and 1907, to later develop the route between 1908 and 1910. A total of 51 wells were constructed along the 1,850 kilometre route, marking a day's travel between each point. By 1929 a reconstruction team was contracted to make repairs to broken down wells and equipment, however this was not completed and the route was subsequently claimed inapt for its original purpose.

During World War II, the Stock Route was reconstructed and repaired, awaiting an expected attack on the northern areas of Western Australia.

Today, the route is frequented by 4WD enthusiasts travelling for the ultimate outback experience rather than the excitement of reaching the destination.

TIPS FOR CANNING STOCK ROUTE TRAVELLERS

Fuel & Other Supplies - Wiluna, Kunawarritju Community (Well 33), Billiluna Community and Halls Creek.

When to travel - April to September.

Water - Take lots of water for drinking purposes and for your vehicle. Well water is of a poor quality, therefore it is suggested that you carry additional water supplies with you.

- Take emergency medications, equipment and communication devices, and ensure that at least one person in your party is able to administer first-aid if necessary.
- Please note that there is an airstrip near the track at Well 33 with regular RFDS nurse support. There are also other airstrips located at each pastoral lease to the south, at Cotton Creek (100 kilometres west of Well 23) and at the Billiluna community.
- Carry a sand flag for times when travelling across sand dune country, to avoid colliding with other vehicles.
- Carry, at minimum, an auto-scanning UHF radio. The recommended station for communication is Channel 40.
- Travel only in small convoys as larger groups can be slower and too far spread for easy communication.
- The section between Wells 2 and 5 is closed to all vehicles towing trailers and 'oversize' vehicles such as Okas or Akas. If travelling in a larger vehicle or towing a trailer, you will need to take an alternative route via Glenayle or Granite Peak Stations.
- Permits are required for travel between wells 5-51. For exact details and how to apply visit www.anfwdc.asn.au

The Canning Stock Route is one of the most isolated 4WD tracks in the world and as such it is not recommended that you attempt to travel the track without extensive outback travel experience and a very safe and reliable vehicle with sufficient supplies.



The OUTBACK WAY



The Outback Way crosses central Australia and is fast becoming one of the must-see and must-do touring routes. The road links Laverton in the Golden Outback's Goldfields to Winton in Queensland via Uluru (Ayers Rock) and Alice Springs.

The 2,800 kilometre Outback Way offers an awe-inspiring journey through some of the most attractive and remote desert areas. Learn about ancient Aboriginal culture, life in the Outback, and the natural environment of Australia's central desert. The route itself is mostly gravel and it's advisable to travel in a high clearance 4WD vehicle, as conditions can include sand drifts and corrugations. The Outback Way is graded regularly and is usually acceptable for towing offroad caravans and trailers.

OUTBACK WAY GEOCACHE TRAIL

The Outback Way-Finder Geocache Trail has 34 'hidden' caches each branded with a distinctive Way-Finder label. The location (coordinates) of each cache can be found at www.geocaching.com and the details can be printed before driving. At most cache sites, visitors are encouraged to take short walks focusing on local flora, wildflowers, woodlands,

geological features, waterholes, historical sites and vantage points. Essential items for geocaching include a handheld GPS, spare batteries, compass, pen, trinkets, water, hat, sunscreen and cache notes. Way-finder Cache Kits are available for purchase at fuel stops along the Outback Way but you must bring a handheld GPS. Visit www.outbackway.org.au for further information and happy hunting!



Wildflower season is one of Western Australia's most fascinating and precious natural treasures. From July through to November the world's largest range of wildflowers bloom.


Starting in the north of Australia's Golden Outback you will see carpets of everlasting as far as the eye can see. Gradually as the weather warms further south, the Wheatbelt bursts into bloom and then finally you can experience the colour of the coastal national parks.

A journey out to see the beautiful array of colours as well as the delicate and unusual features of many of the species, makes a wonderful day trip or extended holiday.

Rains and sunshine greatly influence the timing of the wildflower season and before departure it is a good idea to telephone the local visitor centre in the area to check the variety of flowers that are blooming and their location.

Although wildflowers can often be seen from the roadside, many interesting species are located off the road and are not difficult to find with information from the visitor centre.

On the previous pages you will find a great range of self drive routes and the ones that burst into colour with wildflowers over spring have been highlighted with this small flower symbol.

The WHEATBELT



The Wheatbelt is a patchwork of golden fields, character townships, pioneering history, fun farm stays, festivals and self drive experiences.

It is also home to Wave Rock - the most recognisable tourist attraction in the region. The rock near Hyden stretches 100 metres and stands 15 metres high in the shape of a giant wave about to crash over the surrounding bush.

There are a number of other unique granite rock outcrops that feature in the Wheatbelt, including Elachbutting and Chiddarcooping near Mukinbudin, Kokerbin Rock at Bruce Rock and Buckley's Breakaway at Kulin.

Animal lovers will adore the Wheatbelt's Dryandra Woodland. This is one of the most important areas in the state for wildlife preservation, harbouring numbats, tamar wallabies, brushtail possums, tawny frogmouth owls and kangaroos. For animals of a different kind, be sure to visit a farmstay. Children in particular delight in finding friends among the cute and cuddly farmyard animals.

While farm animals may keep the children entertained, the grown-ups will revel in the fantastic fresh produce. Olive oil, wines, preserves, yabbies, emu oil and lavender products on offer in the Wheatbelt.

The Wheatbelt is also the scene of one of nature's most dazzling shows. From July to early November the landscape explodes into colour as wildflowers burst into bloom.

Along with the wildflowers, the Wheatbelt offers a rich pioneering history with stories of early day explorers and settlers, and of fortunes made and lost in the Wheatbelt's gold rush.

Be sure to time your Wheatbelt adventure to coincide with one of the many spectacular events or festivals.

WILDFLOWERS

From July to early November the Wheatbelt comes alive with everlastings, acacia, hakea, grevillea, lechenaultia, wreath flowers and orchids. As wildflowers are dependent on seasonal rain, it is advisable to seek wildflower touring information from local visitor centres prior to departure.



A comfortable 2 hour drive south-east of Perth, Narrogin is the commercial centre of Dryandra Country and an ideal base from which to explore the Southern Wheatbelt. Depending on seasonal variations, spring is the best time to view wildflowers and July to December for orchids. Summer offers the chance to see numbats in their natural habitat. The township offers modern facilities for travellers including a variety of cafes, heritage buildings, walk trails, art galleries, pubs, clubs and a vibrant cultural scene. PLACES OF INTEREST

Dryandra Woodland
Nearby is Dryandra Woodland a valuable nature conservation area featuring one of the largest remnants of original vegetation in the Wheatbelt. It is home to Western Australia's state animal emblem the numbat and other endangered species. Nestled within Dryandra Woodland is Barna Mia, an animal sanctuary for threatened marsupials where you have the opportunity to view these rare and fascinating creatures in their native habitat on a nocturnal tour (bookings essential).

Foxes Lair Nature Park
Explore Foxes Lair Nature Park, a 60 hectare bush land area within the town boundary, climb Yilliminning and Birdwhistle Rocks for great views of surrounding farmlands. Have a picnic at the Railway Dam or Gnarojin Park and call in at the Old Courthouse Museum for a step back in time. Walk around town and enjoy the architecture of the bustling railway town that once was here.

ATTRACTIONS AND FACILITIES

For those actively inclined, Narrogin is surrounded by many natural attractions which offer great photo opportunities, birdlife, wildflowers, granite outcrops, woodlands and lakes. Many have developed walking trails. The Leisure Centre has a large indoor heated pool, gym and sporting facilities. Gliding flights are also available at Narrogin Airfield.

Accommodation
There is a caravan park within the town as well as motels, hotels and other self-contained accommodation including farm stays. Dryandra Country Visitor Centre provides ample caravan parking and access to the RV dump. The friendly volunteers will direct you to all the facilities you need and offer suggestions for what to see and do. A short walk places

you within the retail centre of town. There are two supermarkets and a large variety of other stores supplying all your essentials. There are plenty of cafes and food outlets. The town is well serviced for mechanical repairs and has a regional hospital with speedy access to Perth in case of emergency.

PINGELLY



158km south-east of Perth along route 126

Situated at the headwaters of the Avon River, Pingelly has been settled from the 1860s. The Shire is a rich and diverse cropping and grazing agricultural area with reliable rainfall, and contributes significantly to the state's wool and grain exports.

Located in the heart of the Central Great Southern Wheatbelt on the Great Southern Highway, Pingelly is a pleasant 90 minute drive from metropolitan Perth and is conveniently situated for visitors to take in a variety of local attractions and diverse day trips.

The townsite is picturesque, with a historical flavour of the early 1900s. There are many parks, free BBQ facilities and picnic areas, playgrounds, gardens and two RV dump sites. Facilities include medical centre, chemist, supermarket (open 7 days), butcher, ATM, community crafts and giftware, op shop, dine-in and takeaway food. Petrol and diesel are available 24/7 using a debit card at Great Southern Fuels, Brown Street.

Located 8 kilometres east of Pingelly, this picturesque site was originally settled in 1864. Many of the original houses and buildings survive which were built by convicts, such as St Patrick's Church, which was consecrated in 1873 and is still in use today.

Boyagin Nature Reserve

Located 26 kilometres north-west of Pingelly. Boyagin Nature Reserve is a designated flora and fauna reserve with picnic, bushwalking activities and wildflowers in season. Boyagin Rock rises 50 metres above the surrounding countryside.

Apex Lookout located on Ironstone Hill

Offers panoramic views of the town and countryside. Access and parking off Balfour Street.

Tutanning Flora and Fauna Reserve

Situated 28 kilometres east of Pingelly, Tutanning is world renowned as a sanctuary for the endangered Tammar wallaby, and for hundreds of wildflower species and native orchids.

Dryandra Woodland

Located approximately 40 kilometres from Pingelly. Dryandra Woodland offers one of the best chances to view native animals in their natural habitat.

Pingelly Community Resource Centre

Pingelly CRC offers a wide range of services, including Pingelly Public Library, public access internet facilities, printing, desktop publishing, fax and email services to name a few. Drop in and meet the friendly staff!

Pingelly Community Craft Centre

Call into the Pingelly Community Craft Centre for a chat and a cup of tea while obtaining tourist information. While here you can purchase local art and crafts, gift lines, souvenirs, and book and pay for overnight stays at the caravan park. Open from 9.30am.

The town is the centre of a thriving Merino stud industry and proud home to the Wagin Woolorama, Western Australia's largest rural show will be held in March 2017.

An easy 3 hour drive from Perth, you will be enthralled with the beautiful rolling Wheatbelt countryside and quaint historical towns along the way.

Settled in early 1880s, Wagin is near a series of ancient lakes and is regarded as the most heritage rich rural town in Western Australia. The streetscapes boast some of the state's most beautiful early 20th century historical hotels; three of these hotels are still in operation. Their architectural significance adds extra interest as you walk the streets of this friendly town absorbing all the charm of a regional farming community.

To acknowledge the prosperity created by the wool industry, you won't be able to miss 'Baart' the Giant Ram on the western side of the town. This iconic attraction is located in a beautiful water park with picnic and BBQ facilities.

PLACES OF INTEREST

Giant Ram

No doubt the most photographed ram in Australia! Come see 'Baart', standing some 9 metres tall and 13 metres in length located in the beautiful Wetlands Park, right alongside the Shire offices as you enter the town.

Wagin Historical Village Museum

This is acclaimed as the largest and best social history museum in Western Australia. Some 25 historical or recreated buildings house the history of the region.

Town Well, Mount Latham and Puntapin

Come see town's original water source, the 1890s Town Well located in the parking bay just off Arthur Road. This water was used prior to the construction of water catchments at Badjarning Rock at Mt Latham and Puntapin Rock. These two granite formations have wonderful views over the town and surrounding farmland areas.

Wait - Jen Walking Trail

Wait - Jen is Aboriginal Noongar language for 'emu's foot-print' and is a relaxing 10.5km walk trail taking about 4 hours one way. It starts just off the Great Southern Highway 8kms south of Wagin and ends at the north end of Norring Lake. This trail interprets local Noongar culture and follows one of the ancient dreaming trails formed by the Wagul, a mythical being that

created tracks by which the Noongar could pass safely. The trail passes through a variety of vegetation types with a wide range of birdlife. Kangaroos can often be seen during the day and the remnant bush is home to nocturnal animals. Signs and information panels contain artwork from local artists and give an outline of Noongar traditions and way of life.

Wagin Woolorama

Some 30,000 people attend this event which gives a fantastic insight into life on the land. The 2 day dog high jump competition is a highlight for visitors.

Wildflowers & Marrobbie Birdpark

Spring is the time to see some of the state's most beautiful wildflower displays. Each year from late August to November wildflowers burst into colour along roadsides, walk trails, parks and reserves. If you are into Australian birdlife and fauna, perhaps also pay a visit to Marrobbie Birdpark. Tel: (08) 9861 1236 for opening hours.

We won't be stopping at this, with exciting display additions to come, making this a must see for travellers! Hand in hand with our Bluebird Replica is one icon that has always been here, Lake Dumbleyung. It is the largest open lake in Western Australia's southwest at 13km in length, 6.5km wide and may very well be the reason the 'Dumbleyung' town name exists, thought to be derived from the Aboriginal word 'Dambeling' meaning large lake or sea. Although the Lake may not be full, you can't miss a picnic at the Yacht Club, watching a sunrise or sunset over the lake or the panoramic photo opportunity at Pussycat Hill Lookout.




Bruce Rock has a number of interesting places to visit, including Bruce's Rock, Kokerbin Rock, Shackleton Lakes and the Ardath Hotel. Bruce Rock provides an excellent base with ample parking and rest areas running the length of the main street, making it easy to explore the surrounding regions, both within the Shire and further throughout the Central Wheatbelt region.

PLACES OF INTEREST

Kokerbin Rock

Covering 9 hectares and rising 122 metres above the ground, Kokerbin Rock is Australia's 3rd largest monolith. Situated 40 kilometres north-west of Bruce Rock, it is a great place for a picnic, with BBQ facilities and toilets.

Bruce's Rock

Named after Sandalwooder, John Rufus Bruce, who used the outcrop as his depot in 1869. There are two old wells located at the picnic site at the foot of the rock, good walks are to be enjoyed over the rock outcrop. BBQ and picnic facilities are available.

Old Railway Dam and Granite Outcrop

Built during the early days of railway in the Shire, the Railway Dam is situated 2 kilometres

east of Bruce Rock. The dam draws water from a series of channels built on a large granite outcrop nearby. The railway dam now provides an interesting walk through bushland on the main natural stone-lined channel up to a granite outcrop, providing views of the town and surrounding farmland.

Federation Amphitheatre and Sculpture Park

Officially opened in October 2001, this outdoor theatre seats up to 800 people. Designed and built entirely by the people of Bruce Rock, it has been host to many events, concerts and private functions.

Bruce Rock Museum

Located on Johnson Street, the museum contains a comprehensive collection of memorabilia. To the rear of the museum you will find an original one room school house and a replica mud brick settler's cottage from pioneering farm days.

Machinery Museum

Opposite the Bruce Rock Museum, the Machinery and Motor Museum houses working farm machinery, a vintage car and a steam traction engine - all from local historical times.

Centennial Mosaic Pathway

Check out the Mosaic Pathway commissioned in 2013 to commemorate the town's centennial. Comprising of 417 slabs, the pathway celebrates the Shire of Bruce Rock's

early settlers, community members, local businesses and sporting clubs.

Kwoiyin Campsite

Extensively upgraded in 2013 this free campsite includes camp kitchen, gas BBQs, shaded picnic facilities, water supply and public facilities, making it ideal for large groups to stay a few days and explore the area's spectacular natural attractions. For more information contact the Shire.





CORRIGIN



235km south-east of Perth

Corrigin was once known as the town of the windmills until the arrival of the water scheme in 1960. It is now famous for its tribute to 'Man's Best Friend' at the unique dog cemetery and is the world record holder for Dogs in a Ute. This grain and grazing town is nestled in the heart of the Wheatbelt only 235km south-east of Perth on the Brookton Highway.

Corrigin has a rich agricultural heritage and the district produces around 171,000 tonnes of wheat in an average year. It boasts a friendly atmosphere for both residents and visitors. The town is nestled at the base of Corrigin Rock and to experience Corrigin on foot the town offers a variety of dedicated tracks and trails.

The town's history is reflected in the windmill entry statement and is showcased at the Pioneer Museum and RSL Memorial Lookout. Corrigin offers all the necessary services and facilities including an adventure playground, swimming pool and a newly constructed Recreation and Events Centre.

PLACES OF INTEREST

Main Street and Miss B's Park

Visit the shops and cafés in Campbell Street just off the Highway. Miss B's Park has picnic and BBQ facilities located in the main street.

Home of the Record Breaking 'Dog in a Ute'

The Dog in a Ute event involves the coming together of two great rural Aussie icons - the 'Ute' and Man's Best Friend, the 'Dog' in an

attempt to break a world record. Corrigin currently holds the world record (1,527) of a continuous queue of Dogs in Utes. This record breaking event was held in Corrigin in 2002, breaking the Victorian record of 797. \$80,000 was raised for the Royal Flying Doctor and community activities.

Pioneer Museum and Rotary Park

Stop for a BBQ or picnic in the shady park and then wander over to the museum with its collection of tools and restored farm machinery, including tractors in working order. See the blacksmith's shop, the old one room school, the shearing shed and a collection of district photographs and other memorabilia. A wall at the entrance commemorates early settlers. Open Sunday 2-5pm and Wednesday 1-4pm or by appointment. Tel: (08) 9063 2930.

Dog Cemetery

Just 5 kilometres west of town, The Dog Cemetery was established in 1974 as a tribute to 'Man's Best Friend'. With over 200 loved ones buried here, the cemetery is unique to Corrigin. Take time to read some of the headstones, the cemetery is landmarked by a statue of a large dog. Anyone is welcome to bury their dog at the cemetery and many have travelled from different towns to lay pets in their final resting place.

Wildflowers and Walk Trails

A 4 kilometre Wildflower Drive starts opposite the Dog Cemetery. Over 200 species can be seen as it meanders through a wide range of soils, from sedgelands to mixed shrubs and various woodlands, some growing in profusion in broken rocks. Take a leisurely walk over the Corrigin Rock on the east edge of town and

enjoy a picnic in the Adventure Playground. Power-walk on the Old Dam Track west of the railway line starting at the old water tower.

Adventure Playground

A great place to picnic with playground equipment for the children. Located next to Corrigin Rock, the Adventure Playground provides plenty of shade and tranquility.

This park has a fort structure with disabled access, a BBQ and picnic setting, shade shelter and play equipment, with a 'space net' to climb on.

Lookouts

Panoramic views of the town and farmlands can be seen from the Anzac Memorial in town or from the Scenic Lookout.

Gorge Rock


Located 20 kilometres from town, Gorge Rock is a natural rock pool which was once the local swimming hole, (before an Olympic pool was constructed in the townsite), offering spectacular panoramic views of the surrounding farmland and countryside around Corrigin.

Enjoy the short walk through the picturesque bushland to get to the rock pool. Although no swimming is allowed in present day, the area is still worth visiting, and a good rest stop with natural bushland making pleasant surroundings.

NAREMBEEN



286km east of Perth

There's so much to see and do in Naremben, a rural country town offering country hospitality and scenery that reflects Australia's true farming lifestyle. Located between Wave Rock and the Great Eastern Highway, Naremben is the perfect location to discover, explore and stay!

Enjoy beautiful nature trails as you take in tall Salmon Gums, native animals, and during spring splendid wildflowers. Climb majestic granite outcrops and enjoy the undisturbed beauty of Naremben. A small country town that offers you convenient amenities and an opportunity to mingle with the friendly locals.

PLACES OF INTEREST

Naremben Grain Discovery Centre

Located within the Naremben Roadhouse, this modern Discovery Centre features brilliant visual and interpretive displays. Learn more about farming in Naremben as you wander through the Centre, open every day 9am to 5pm.

Roe Lookout

A photographer's delight, situated approximately 8km from Naremben and named after John Septimus Roe, Surveyor-General, a scenic drive takes you to the peak of this granite formation with magnificent panoramic views of the district. There is limited vehicle access to the top of Roe Lookout, the steep incline is not suitable for caravans. Park at the bottom and take a leisurely walk to the top of the lookout.

Roe Dam

A bird watcher's paradise, located approximately 45kms east of Naremben is a 20 million gallon storage dam completed in 1971. Take in the majestic eucalyptus with an under-story of bracken fern. Picnic areas, toilets and BBQs are available in this tranquil setting.

Hidden Hollow

The perfect place to rest and have a picnic, located approximately 30km east of Naremben. See many wildflowers and orchids during spring (Aug to Oct). A scenic walk trail leads you to a natural amphitheatre that has been carved out of the rock over years of weathering. For the more energetic - the view from the summit offers spectacular views of the district.

Step Back in Time

Visit one of the many historical museums in Naremben including St Paul's Museum, History Museum, the War Museum and the Machinery Museum. For location and tours contact the Naremben CRC T: (08) 9064 7055 during business hours.

The Old Prospector's Trail

Take a short self drive tour (38kms) starting west of Naremben at Dayman Road, the Old Prospector's Trail will have you transported back in time. Follow the signs which will take you back to the early days when sandalwood cutters and gold prospectors travelled this trail in search of riches. Interpretive displays, old water wells, reconstructed prospector's camp and undisturbed landscapes are part of this must do short loop. The trail is a work in progress. Roads are subject to flooding so please check with the Shire of Naremben T: (08) 9064 7308 on current road conditions.

Spectacular Wildflowers

Experience Naremben's wildflower reserves, walk trails and roadsides which put on a spectacular seasonal show of colour during spring (Aug-Oct).

Naremben Hawk

A trip to Naremben must include a visit to the Naremben Hawk, located at the Naremben Recreation Centre, Currall Street. Unveiled in April 2016, the hawk is the symbol of Naremben's sporting clubs, and the sculpture has a wingspan of 2.5 meters and includes

1,000 individually cut feathers and fashioned using metal collected from around the district. The magnificent sculpture took local artist Jordan Sprigg 260 hours to complete!

282km south-east of Perth

Kondinin was first settled in 1909 and surveyed in 1910 for selection for the early pioneer farmers. At this time, the red fertile loam soils were highly sought after by the pioneers for growing crops. Today, Kondinin is the main centre for the Shire, and plays a significant role in the state's agricultural industry.

Interesting places to visit are the Kondinin Lake, JS Roe Heritage Trail, Woorkakanin Rock, enjoy a stroll through natural woodlands on the Kondinin Bush Walk or head out to Yeerakine Rock for a picnic or to walk the trails through the beautiful bushland.

PLACES OF INTEREST

Kondinin Bush Walk

Natural woodland covering over 50 hectares.

Kondinin Lake

When full great for water skiing and windsurfing. Perfect spot to view waterbirds.

JS Roe Heritage Trail

Includes a mural of the JS Roe Expedition of 1848-49, Kondinin Well and Yeerakine Rock.

Woorkakanin Rock

Once used as a water supply for steam trains at Kondinin Railway Station and now part of the 18 hole Kondinin Golf Course.

Granite and Woodlands Discovery Trail

Runs between Hyden and Norseman and offers 16 designated places of interest, including natural and cultural history. See page 11.

Art Show and Twilight Markets

Early October – The Annual Kondinin Art show draws artistic creations from all over WA and provides a great weekend getaway paired with a local Twilight Markets at the local Community Garden.

Yeerakine Rock

Located 12km east of Kondinin offering shady picnic areas, two walk trails with interpretive signage and 360 degree views from the

summit. Yeerakine Rock is also a great place to view wildflowers each September and October. The best time to view the inspiring Light Horse memorial is during Kondinin's dawn ANZAC Day service.

Kondinin Centenary Walk

Located in the centre of Kondinin, next to the caravan park, stroll along the mosaic pathway and marvel at the collection of Ironman sculptures all built in 2010 to celebrate the town's centenary.

326km south-east of Perth

This town of less than 50 people was first settled in the early 1920s. View the Catholic Church with its unique stone frontage built in the 1960s. See a mosaic featuring the area's flora and fauna, also make sure you call in at Tressie's Museum. Scenic vistas can be seen at McCanns Rock and the Karlgarin Hills.



342km south-east of Perth

Although best known for Wave Rock, there is so much more for travellers to do in and around the well-equipped and thriving community of Hyden, including amazing rock formations, dazzling wildflowers in season and clear starry nights. Be sure to visit Wave Rock, Mulka's Cave, Hippo's Yawn, Lake Magic and the State Barrier Fence - all of great geological and historical interest.

From Hyden you can travel to Norseman through some of Australia's most pristine woodlands, the Granite and Woodlands Discovery Trail with 16 designated places of interest.

PLACES OF INTEREST

Wave Rock Walk

From the car park to the Rock, then along the foot of the wave formation to the old quarry site at the western end. It is 325 metres each way, flat and easy to walk. Features several shaded stone seats and quality interpretation about the formation of Wave Rock. The path links with Hippo's Yawn, The Breakers Trail and the Hyden Rock Walk.

The Breakers Trail

Follows Wave Rock initially, then branches off at the old quarry site and traces the foot of the outcrop to the historic Breakers picnic area. The trail is 675 metres each way, flat and easy to walk. Interpretative signs deal with both social history and aspects of the rock outcrop and the surrounding vegetation.

The Hippo's Yawn Loop

Follows the main path to the base of the Rock, then branches off to the east to follow the foot of the outcrop to Hippo's Yawn. From there it returns to the car park. The loop is 1,030 metres to the Yawn and a further 680 metres back to the car park, making it a total of 1,710 metres. The trail is well marked, flat and easy to walk.

The Wave Rock Circuit

Leads directly from main information signs in car park to Hippo's Yawn, then loops out through the salt lake landscape to the north of Hyden Rock, before returning to car park, café and shops. 3.6kms long, with wide flat surface. 15 interpretive panels range from Aboriginal and early settlement stories to birds, the night sky and weather. Suitable for families with small children in pushers or visitors with bicycles.



Located in the Southern Wheatbelt the Lake Grace region invites you to experience its wide open spaces and stars, vast salt lake environments along ancient river systems and friendly country towns where the locals always have time for chat and you can experience country hospitality at its best.

Travel our open roads and enjoy the natural beauty of the farming landscape sprinkled with natural salt lakes shimmering in shades of pinks, greens and mauves. Stop over at any of our town caravan parks and enjoy a warm country welcome.

See the countryside come alive with wildflowers in spring and take the time to enjoy the native wildlife in our larger than average nature reserves, perfect for picnics and hikers. LAKE GRACE



345kms south east of Perth on the Esperance to Perth, Albany to Hyden crossroads.

Lake Grace is a thriving rural town and the major centre in the region. It was named after a shallow lake 10km west of the townsite. Lake Grace itself is one of Western Australia's largest inland salt lakes and a nationally significant wetland comprising of two separate bodies of water – Lake Grace North and Lake Grace South.

Lake Grace offers some fascinating public artwork from the story trail around the centre of town to the mural of pioneering women from the region.

Visit the restored Stationmaster's House now operating as the Shire Visitor Centre with local produce, arts and crafts on sale. Right next door is the Lake Grace Regional Artspace featuring exhibitions from local artists, guest exhibitors and artists in residence.

For heritage Lake Grace has the only remaining Australian Inland Mission Hospital in WA that has been restored as a museum. This museum is located at the western end of the town and provides a fascinating insight into the challenges faced by early settlers and how medical needs were catered for in the isolated inland. Follow the penny pathway from the park bay to the AIM to discover the story. You can also follow the trail to the Mosaic Garden Gallery which feature 365 mosaics created by locals to represent the past and present.

Sample wines from our local winery located 8km north of Lake Grace and don't miss a visit to Rifle Range Hill, 5kms east of town on the main road, ideal for viewing wildflowers between August and November each year.

NEWDEGATE

397kms south east of Perth on the Esperance to Perth Route.

'Gateway to the Holland Track' - follow the traces of John Holland's 1893 epic journey when he and his partners cut the now famous Holland Track. Along the 'Track' explore the salt lakes along the ancient river systems and immerse yourself in the natural beauty of Dragon Rock Reserve resplendent in spring wildflowers.

Time your trip to include the Newdegate Machinery Field Days on the first Wednesday and Thursday in September each year when the town comes alive. Take a look at the satellite photo located at Pioneer Park in the town centre and get an overview of this ancient river system.

Whilst in town step back in time and visit the Hainsworth Museum to see a bygone era and many historical artefacts of the local general store.

LAKE KING



460kms south east of Perth on the Esperance Perth, Brookton Highway junction.

A small rural town on the fringe of the Wheatbelt's sheep and wheat farming country, the area truly comes alive during spring and boasts some of the districts best wildflowers. Walk trails through the town's bushland enable visitors to take short self guided walks and enjoy the wildflowers, native vegetation, birdlife and a little local history. Trail maps are available from local retail outlets.

South of the town, the Roe Heritage Trail retraces part of Surveyor General Roe's historical journey in 1848 and features flora and fauna reserves, historical sites and panoramic views of the countryside.

Travel 30kms east on the Lake King Norseman Road to the Rabbit Proof Fence which boasts a truly magnificent display of wildflowers when in season. Make sure you call in at the Lake King Tractor Museum with its exhibit of locally made tractors.

VARLEY

40kms south of Hyden on Brookton Highway.

A small community with the motto 'Great Place Small Crowd'. Travel from Varley to Hatters Hill or to the historic Rabbit Proof Fence that skirts the eastern end of the Shire.

The town rabbit cemetery is the community's tribute to the rabbit plague of the 1920s that was a major pestilence to early farmers in the Shire. Gold was discovered at Hatters Hill in the early part of the twentieth century and the small settlement is now uninhabited and an interesting spot for fossickers.

The town has a comprehensive museum established in 2001 with interesting displays of memorabilia and historic town records.

Explore the route of a really impressive engineering feat, C.Y O'Connor's water pipeline constructed over 100 years ago. Visit the old pumping station sites and highlights like the Cunderdin Museum No.3 Pump Station, historical landmarks or Merredin's No.4 Pump Station a stabilised ruin. Marvel at the 1968 earthquake interpretation story and memorial sites at Meckering and experience an earthquake simulation room inside the Cunderdin Museum.

Don't miss the view from the Kellerberrin Hill lookout as the pipeline takes you past rock water catchments and springtime wildflowers to Totadgin Conservation Park 14kms south of Merredin. Merredin Peak walk trails follow an 1890's water catchment scheme and rock channel from Railway Dam over the granite outcrop. Cross the original site of the No.1 Rabbit Proof Fence at Burracoppin and north from Carrabin is Westonia where history is preserved in the buildings facades. The gold mining and social history is encapsulated in the remarkable Hood-Penn Museum with a mine blast simulation tunnel.

At Southern Cross take in the Yilgarn History Museum displays and collections and travelling 50km east to Karalee Rock reservoir is a remarkable early example of a timber and steel aqueduct water catchment feature. Natural history abounds as you travel on through the Great Western Woodlands stopping along the Great Eastern Highway at RV Friendly sites following the Golden Pipeline Heritage Trail onto Coolgardie and Kalgoorlie.


PIONEERS' PATHWAY

Duration: 2 to 4 days

Distance: One way Perth
via Toodyay to Merredin 292km

Road Conditions: Sealed road with some unsealed access roads into nature reserves.

Accommodation: Bed & Breakfasts, Self-Contained, Heritage Homestead, Motels, Hotels, Caravan Parks and RV Friendly Camp Sites.



Take this delightful scenic route traversed by the early pioneers in search of farmland and the lure of the eastern goldfields. Starting in picturesque Toodyay nestled along the Avon River and travelling through to the regional hub town of Merredin.

Step back in time and stay at the heritage listed Slaters Homestead 2.5km east of Goomalling. Visit one of the earliest bulk handling wheatbins now housing the Wyalkatchem Museum with heritage machinery and rare tractor displays. Camp at the National Trust's Mangowine Homestead 14kms north of Nungarin. An impressive 1897 steam locomotive, rolling stock and railway history is on display at the Merredin Railway Museum or take in a live show at historic Cummins Theatre.

World War II history comes alive at the Nungarin Heritage Machinery and Army Museum, the Merredin Military Museum and the 2/1st Army General Field Hospital site at Merredin Peak Reserve. Walk the many nature reserves protecting large areas of natural bushland and granite outcrops where magnificent eucalypt trees dominate the landscape and seasonal wildflowers carpet the forest floor. Explore the Tin Dog Creek Walk Trail or Namelcatchem Reserve at Dowerin or other town reserves such as Korrelocking at Wyalkatchem, Billycatting at Trayning, Talgomine at Nungarin and Tamma Park and Totadgin CP near Merredin.




CUNDERDIN

158km east of Perth

Cunderdin is a major Wheatbelt town situated on the Great Eastern Highway approximately a two hour drive from Perth. The town was settled and has evolved into the Wheatbelt centre it is today as a result of the development of the Coolgardie/Kalgoorlie Goldfields railway in 1894 and the Goldfields water supply pipeline in 1901. The Number 3 Pumping Station, one of eight which relayed water from Mundaring to Kalgoorlie along this pipeline was situated in Cunderdin. The heritage building now houses the amazing Cunderdin Museum.

PLACES OF INTEREST

Cunderdin Museum

The Museum is the central attraction to the Shire and many visitors comment that it is arguably one of the best rural Museums they have seen. Apart from the Pumping Station machinery and memorabilia, the large collection also includes Indigenous district culture, agricultural industry, railways, Cunderdin training aircraft from World War II, the original Quelagetting School, the Telegraph, Meckering earthquake simulator and much more. No visitor should miss the opportunity to experience the many displays offered which, together weave a rich historical tapestry of the district's heritage.

Cunderdin Hill Lookout

It appears quite inconspicuous, but it's definitely worth taking the time to venture to the top of Cunderdin Hill (1km south of the main street). You'll be greeted by 360 degree panoramic views of the town and surrounding farmland - a view that gives a real sense of the wide open spaces and big blue sky.

Ettamogah Pub

There's one landmark you certainly won't miss when you visit Cunderdin - the brightly coloured and rather distinctive Ettamogah Pub. Based on the well known comics of Ken Maynard - made famous by the Australian Post magazine - the pub is not only a novelty for tourists but an important central hub for residents in the Shire.

Bulgin Rock Reserve

Bulgin Rock, located off Burges Road is the perfect place to absorb the rolling landscape and it's easy to see why it's been a popular picnic spot for more than a century. Sitting amongst the sheoak woodland you'll probably glimpse a variety of birds and, at the right time of year an abundance of colourful wildflowers including a beautiful display of orchids.

Youndegin

Immerse yourself in our fascinating past by taking a trip to Youndegin (19km south of Cunderdin along the Cunderdin-Quairading Road, then left on the Goldfields Road), here you'll find the original police outpost. Built from stone and mud with a thatched roof, the outpost's answer to the modern day 'lock-up' was a nearby York Gum.

MECKERING

132km east of Perth

The name originates from a local Aboriginal language meaning 'Place of water' or 'Moon on water'. The town formerly called Beebering was established in 1887 then renamed Meckering in 1897. Today, Meckering is probably best known for the devastating earthquake in October 1968 with many of the place of interests relating to this event. Meckering is still a vibrant and thriving country community, although with its relatively small population the town is resilient and achieves more than many areas twice its size.

PLACES OF INTEREST

The Big Camera - Museum of Photography

It is impossible to miss this unique building on the Highway. An amazing history of photography is on display including a wonderful collection of earthquake images.

Meckering Earthquake Gazebo and Memorial Rose Garden

Explore the devastation of the 1968 Meckering earthquake firsthand at this impressive display which includes a section of the damaged railway line, a mangled piece of the Golden Pipeline, photographs, statistics and information. Take a stroll across the road to the beautiful memorial rose garden - a tribute to the dedication and hard work of many local volunteers.

Meckering Earthquake Farm Ruins




The Meckering earthquake registered 6.9 on the Richter Scale, crushing many of the town's buildings and residential properties. 'Salisbury' - an old stone homestead built in 1904 - was flattened during the quake and a local family narrowly missed tragedy managing to locate their child amongst the rubble. The ruins give an eerie insight into the scale of the devastation experienced (2km north of Meckering, turn off Meckering to Goomalling Road).

Meckering Earthquake Preserved Fault Line

While only lasting 40 seconds, the Meckering earthquake had a lifetime impact on this small Wheatbelt town. Leaving a scar 32km long and in some parts up to 2m high, the earthquake literally tore open the earth. You can still see 1km of the fault line that's been preserved for viewing (12km south of Meckering on York-Meckering Road).

KELLERBERRIN



202km east of Perth

Kellerberrin is situated in the hub of the historically rich Wheatbelt region. A comfortable 2½ hours drive from Perth along the Goldfields Trail makes Kellerberrin the perfect town to set up base for self drive discoveries in the surrounding area.

The town offers all the modern facilities for visitors who are passing through or stopping over including a supermarket, accommodation, caravan park, chemist, doctor's surgery, hospital and much more.

The countryside around Kellerberrin just beckons to be explored. Sweeping golden plains lead to stunning natural attractions, rocky outcrops and scenic hills, giving a panoramic perspective of the region. In springtime, the countryside blooms as a parade of wildflowers adorn the roadside, hills and plains.

Discover a bygone era along the heritage walking trail. Start at the historical museum then take a leisurely hour-long walk through the town past charming historic buildings and churches, concluding at the stunning Kellerberrin Hill Lookout.

PLACES OF INTEREST

Museum

The Agricultural Hall was the first building to be built in Kellerberrin in 1897. The Hall itself has had a colourful life, also serving as a school, courthouse and Road Board offices. Don't miss the surrounding Pioneer Park; it sets the scene, displaying farming machinery through the ages.

Centenary Park

Relax in the centre of town in this shady park featuring children's playground, heritage walkway and barbecue facilities.

Kellerberrin Hill Lookout

Walk or drive to take in the breathtaking views from the lookout. This is a special treat in spring as the hill supports a mass of native wildflowers.

Kokerbin Rock

30 kilometres from Kellerberrin, Kokerbin Rock is the third largest monolith in WA. The area contains a mini Wave Rock, Dog Rock, Devils Marbles and a historic well. A walk to the top of the rock provides panoramic views of the countryside.

Wildflowers

From August to November, follow the flowers along the Kellerberrin/Bencubbin Road to Durokoppin Reserve. This 1,500 acre reserve of woodland, heath and mallee supports a wide variety of flora and fauna. Discover tea trees, wattle and grevillea amongst a colourful array of species. Free information maps are available from Kellerberrin Community Resource Centre.

Milligan Homestead

While taking the Kellerberrin/Bencubbin Road, look out for the homestead some 10 kilometres north of the town. Built from local field stone in 1871, it can be viewed from the roadside.

Mt Stirling / Mt Caroline

Head 25 kilometres south of Kellerberrin to capture the magnificent views of these giant granite outcrops. These formations hold great importance to the Njaki Njaki people through their association to the Dreamtime sacred snake, the Moulack. Today these rocks are inhabited by a rare species, the black footed rock wallaby.

Doodlakine Well Site

The well was the reason for the existence of this once bustling town. Today follow a heritage walk trail to the well.

Baandee Ski Lake

Depending on the time of year and the rainfall, the lakes may be full of water or nothing more than a layer of salt. When full, enjoy the excitement of water skiing.

Kellerberrin Caravan Park



MERREDIN  
260km east of Perth

A comfortable 3 hour drive from Perth or Kalgoorlie, Merredin is the perfect place from which to stop and explore the Central Wheatbelt. With cafes, restaurants, many styles of accommodation to suit your budget, two tour operators and a variety of retail shopping, Merredin will entice you to stay for a few days to explore further into the shire's scenic countryside and agricultural landscapes.

Explore our town on foot or hire one of the visitor centre's Electric Pedal-Assist Trikes. Ride the CBD Heritage Trail or one of the 8km or 15km trails.

Perfect for family and pet friendly escapes, experience a night at the base of Merredin Peak where travellers receive free overnight 24 hour RV parking in a sheltered location, fully self-contained Caravans or RV's only.

Merredin Peak, adjacent to the town, is a massive granite rock and water catchment that provided water for the early Aboriginal people and then explorers, sandalwood cutters and prospectors. Take the rock walk to the peak for a spectacular sunset or the bush walk for seasonal wildflowers and nature. Aboriginal Cultural Tours available.

Totadgin Conservation Park and Tamma Park, offer interpretive walks among natural bushland and granite outcrops. Over 980 species of wildflowers are stunning during late winter and spring after good rains. Head to Apex Park for a BBQ and playground or enjoy a family picnic at Roy Little Park with grassed area, paved paths and duck pond with fountain.

Numerous heritage and military sites relate to the towns' role in World War II taking you back in time. Visit the Military Museum with many of the vehicles and machinery in working order, or visit the Railway Museum with its rolling stock and extensive railway and social history collections. Children will love the big orange 1897 steam locomotive and carriages. Stay overnight and see a show at historic Cummins Theatre, dine out and enjoy the ambiance of a friendly country town. WESTONIA



316km east of Perth

'Wessy', as the locals call it, is located just over 3 hours' drive to the east of Perth, where the Wheatbelt meets the Goldfields. The town owes its origin to gold mining, although now it relies to a large extent on wheat and sheep farming. In 1915 Westonia had two mines in operation and by 1917 there was a population in excess of 2,000. This quickly diminished when all mining ceased in 1948.

The Edna May Mine to the north of the town is now in its third phase of operation, after operations between 1985 and 1992. It was reopened by Catalpa Resources in 2010 and then taken over by Evolution Mining in 2011. The Edna May Gold Mine, is still in operation, producing on average 90,000 ounces of gold per annum.

The town is located along the Golden Pipeline Heritage Trail and also the Wheatbelt Way self-drive trails and boasts a beautifully built historic façade main street, but don't be deceived, inside what appears to be historic pubs and shops you will find a museum and the Shire offices.

PLACES OF INTEREST

Hood-Penn Museum

This museum features a variety of social history scenes showcasing early life in the Shire. The museum also includes a mine tunnel and a blast simulation that aims to replicate life in an early Westonian gold mine. Open hours: Mon-Fri 9am-4.30pm and Sat-Sun 10am-12pm.

Wolfram Street

The charming main street of the town with its historic buildings and new buildings built in a historic style. You will see the facades of the town's original bank, café, hotel, fire station, boarding house and green grocer.

Nature Trail

Walk along the bio diverse nature trail through some 4,000 hectares of natural woodlands or take a picnic at one of several nature reserves with spectacular rock formations

Elachbutting Rock

Located 100km north of Westonia on Elachbutting Road. The name Elachbutting means 'big thing standing' a prominent landmark which has excellent views from the top. It has two spectacular colourful waves, a 40m tunnel 'Montys Pass' caused by a rock slide and a large acoustic cave named 'Kings Cave'.

Baladjie Rock

Baladjie rock is located on the Koorda-Bullfinch Road 42km north-east of Westonia. Extensive granite outcrops in attractive woodland setting adjacent to Baladjie Lake. Climb the main rock for spectacular views of the nearby lake system and surrounding

landscape. This is a popular camping spot in the milder months.

Westonia Common and Reserve/ Boodalin Soak

Westonia is nestled inside a common of 5,600 hectares of remnant woodland. Situated 6km west from Westonia just off Stoneman Road, Boodalin Soak was a historic water and rest place for travellers to the Goldfields and was the place of capture for Moondyne Joe (Western Australia's best known bushranger) in 1866. The stonework is an early example of circular dry stone wall construction. An array of wildflowers is also prevalent at the Soak in season.

Yanneymoon Rock and Reserve

Located on the corner of Elachbutting and Echo Valley Roads, 75km north of Westonia this 513 hectare reserve comprises granite rock formations and bushland. Spot the abundant ornate dragon lizard (Ctenophorus ornatus) which is an inhabitant of Yanneymoon Rock and an abundance of everlastings and other wildflowers in season.

Sandford Rocks Nature Reserve

10kms north east of Westonia experience 806 hectares of granite outcrop, pools, wildflowers scrub and woodland. Silver Mallee and Purple Peacock Beetles are thought to exist only on the granite outcrops in this reserve. Try your luck at locating many species of birds from the newly constructed bird hide located on the walk trail, on the edge of the ephemeral rock pool.

Chiddaracooing Reserve

This is a reserve covering 5,262 hectares 50kms north of Westonia and has abundant and unique flora and fauna such as the cowlslip orchid. The reserve is home to the lesser bottlebrush or Callistemon Phoeniceus one of only two bottlebrush species native to south-west Western Australia.

Wildflowers

Westonia has a fantastic array of wildflowers that bloom from late August to early October. These include Red Morrell Eucalypts, everlastings and orchids along Westonia's walk trail. At Elachbutting Rock also see wattles, senna, grevilleas and hakeas.

Edna May Lookout

Located on the old Warrachuppin Road, exit off Boodarockin Road at northern end of Westonia townsite. View the operational mine clearly and maybe see a blast. Blast times available from Shire office.

Westonia Gallery Café

An original 1916 shop serving WA roasted coffee as well as showcasing art, photography and jewellery. Open Mon-Thu 8am-4pm.

SOUTHERN CROSS

368km east of Perth



The town of Southern Cross was founded in 1888 and is named after the stars that guided the first settlers to the place. Today all the streets and the salt lake in the area are named after stars and constellations.

If you are sightseeing or just taking a break from driving there are many interesting sites, facilities and amenities situated within town. Off Great Eastern Highway on Antares Street you find coffee shops, a supermarket, a hardware shop, post office, pub, bank, op-shop and hairdresser.

Located in the main street, you can rest under the shade of a gum tree in the Rotary Park, with well-appointed BBQ and toilet facilities. Visit the Shire Office for all tourist information or reminisce at the Yilgarn Historical Museum. If visiting during summer come and have a splash to cool down in our well-presented pool, free of charge!

PLACES OF INTEREST

In Southern Cross

Southern Cross Dog Exercise Park

Come and exercise your four-legged friend at the specifically designed dog exercise area located conveniently close to the RV dump point on the corner of Achernar and Sirius Street.

Yilgarn History Museum

Located on Antares Street see the earliest Registrar's Office in Western Australia, now the Museum, built in 1892. Displays include a recreated prospectors camp, prospecting gear, authentic 5-head stamp battery, bottle and mineral collection, agricultural, transport and water supply artefacts, early educational items and collection of photos and citations of Yilgarn servicemen and much more. Opening hours: Mon-Sat 9.30am-12pm and 1.30pm-4pm. Sun: 1.30pm-4pm.

Wimmera Hill Lookout

This lookout allows visitors to view the townsite of Southern Cross, the surrounding farmland and gold mines.

PLACES OF INTEREST

Along your journey to or from Southern Cross

Karalee Dam

Collecting water running off the rocks, the construction of this significant aqueduct was made to provide water to the dam for slow steam trains en route to Kalgoorlie. It has excellent picnic and camping facilities and is located 56 kilometres east along the Great Eastern Highway.

Frog Rock

A miniature wave-like formation, dam and picnic area located 30 kilometres southwest of Southern Cross.

Marvel Loch

This town is located 35 kilometres south of Southern Cross and was named after the horse that won the Caulfield Cup in 1905. Gold was discovered in the area in 1906 and mining operations are ongoing today.

ANNUAL EVENTS

26 January 2017 - Australia Day

Free cooked breakfast in Rotary Park followed by awards and free children's entertainment. Visitors most welcome.

25 April 2017 - ANZAC Day

Commemorative service at the War Memorial on Antares Street in Southern Cross, 6am Dawn Service and 11am main service followed by free community BBQ luncheon.

August 2017 - King of the Cross

An annual event held by the Southern Cross Motorcycle Club, drawing competitors from all over the country and overseas. The event is held just a few kilometres out of Southern Cross on a world-class motocross track that includes excellent camping facilities. See www.sxmcc.com.au for further information.

September 2017 - Yilgarn Agricultural Show

Held annually since 1957, the Yilgarn Agricultural Show is a fun-filled day enjoyed by all ages. Starting with a parade and concluding with fireworks. Exhibitions showcasing agriculture, mining and local talent, children's entertainment and food.

September 2017 - Yilgarn Car and Bike Show and Swap Meet

Popular event showcasing cars and motorbikes of all ages and makes. On Saturday you are invited to a scenic point to point drive followed by dinner and music. The WHEATBELT WAY Drive Trail

The Wheatbelt Way self drive trail, will lead visitors on an adventurous interpretive journey to the regional communities of Dowerin, Wyalkatchem, Koorda, Bencubbin, Beacon, Westonia, Mukinbudin, Nungarin and Trayning. Experience their natural attractions, history and heritage while offering unique opportunities to stay and experience friendly communities and open landscapes.

Duration: 3 - 5 days or more

Distance: Approximately 900km - 1,000km

Road Conditions: Sealed with stretches of good unsealed road to rock and bushland features.

This journey offers a memorable contrast of open farmlands, large rocky outcrops, with a profusion of bird and animal life. Marvel at the fascinating ways water was collected in the area, from the natural and Aboriginal gnamma holes, the pastoralists and prospectors wells to the water harvested from granite rocks in more recent times.

Depending on seasonal conditions there are carpets of small pink and yellow everlastings and numerous flowering shrubs, hakea, grevillea, wattle and eremophila, senna, dampiera and verticordia. Native orchids can be found, in early spring at the damp base of the granite outcrops while later in the season red bottlebrush and kunzea grow between the cracks.


Bird lovers will also find numerous birds wherever there is water collected on the granite rocks. Some of the rocks are massive with waves, caves and a tunnel. Views from the top are always breathtaking.

A variety of museums include, army, hospital, early farm machinery, the first CBH bulk handling wheatbin and a pioneer town house.

For the blokes a visit to the many men's sheds with their old operating farm machinery is a highlight. While the ladies may like to join their country cousins at any of the several quilting and craft groups.

Wondering where to stay?

There are excellent caravan parks available in most towns with cabin accommodation or camp under the stars at free camping sites with toilets, BBQs and picnic tables. For more personalised service try a country pub or any of the B&Bs available (bookings advised).

DOWERIN

156km north-east of Perth



Dowerin is 156km east of Perth, or an easy two hour drive via Northam or Toodyay. Nestled amongst open paddocks of golden wheat and grazing sheep, Dowerin is located on the popular Wheatbelt Way or Pioneers' Pathway self drive trails. It is a well serviced country town with a district high school, community club, bakery, two banks, various other retail stores and a variety of community groups and sporting clubs.

First settlement took place in 1897 to establish the farming culture which remains the mainstay of business today. Dowerin is located on the Goldfields Track and has a series of wells marking the way to Yilgarn and the Goldfields. Some of these wells were constructed prior to 1865.

Dowerin has many natural attractions including rocky outcrops, reserves with a multitude of flora and fauna and is also a place rich in history. Enjoy the historical walk trail around town, visit 'Rusty' the Tin Dog or just sit in Centenary Park with a cuppa and watch the world go by.

PLACES OF INTEREST

'Rusty' the Tin Dog

'Rusty' the Tin Dog stands guard at the west entrance to town. This was an innovative project designed by students from Dowerin District High School in 2004 who were inspired after discovering the legend of Tin Dog Creek. Parking and picnic facilities are available at the adjacent information bay on Goldfields Road.

Tin Dog Creek Walk Trail and Bird Hide

The walk trail is just off Redding Road, approximately 100m from the Information Bay on Goldfields Road. Walk through some of the last strands of untouched natural bush in the Wheatbelt by choosing one of 2 trails (long or short). Several interpretive panels are located along the trail providing interesting information about the surroundings. Some features along the way include the Kangaroo Freeway, the Gimlet and York Gum Wonderland, Melaleuca Maze and the Hobbits Forest.

Dowerin Museum

Located on Cottrell Street, opposite Anderson Street. This original 1915 residence is bursting with artefacts and memorabilia. Built in 1915 by Mr Eugene O'Shaughnessy, the old O'Shaughnessy family home has been restored and filled with furnishings from yesteryear to create an authentic feel to this museum. Further to the ambience of the cottage, a wander in the backyard reveals a reconstructed saddlery and shed complete with blacksmiths and saddlery tools. Can be viewed by appointment only. Please call the Shire Office on (08) 9631 1202 to arrange a viewing.

Minnivale

Once a bustling town, Minnivale is now home to a spectacular array of wildflowers from July to October. Driving through Minnivale today you will see the brick store built in 1921 still displaying advertisements from long ago, the church built in 1925 and the old baker's oven still standing in the main street.

A new history is emerging in Minnivale with the development of the Wheatbelt Heritage Rail Project based out of the former CBH Wheat Bin. Although in its early stages, work has commenced to transform the former Wheat Bin into a Heritage Rail Interpretative Centre celebrating the past using today's technology featuring a light and sound show, operating steam experience and interactive displays. Transporting passengers to a time gone by, heritage steam and diesel locomotives will conduct excursions from Goomalling via Dowerin to Wyalkatchem. Complete with saloon, buffet and sleeping cars, the heritage trains will operate to service community and tourist events.

Namelcatchem Well

Namelcatchem Well is located in a 600 acre DPaW Class A1 Reserve, 17km east of Dowerin, at the intersection of the Cunderdin-Minnivale and Goomalling-Merredin Roads. Built sometime before 1865, making it the earliest European built structure in the area, this well was initially used to provide water for miners and travellers. Later horse teams carting wheat to Minnivale found it essential as it held sufficient water for 70 horses.

The Rabbit Proof Fence No.2

This fence runs north/south through the eastern third of the Shire. It was built in 1907/1908 and much of the fence remains in good condition. Mile posts mark the distance from the south coast. The fence originally went from Point Ann to north of Cue, where it turned east to join Rabbit Proof Fence No.1 at Gum Creek.

It is one of three long fences in the state designed to control the rabbit plague, which could wreak enormous havoc in agricultural areas. The fences failed in their purpose, although much time and money was expended to make them work. They stand as a monument to human intention to control a pest, which was and is a national problem.

Dowerin GWN7 Machinery Field Days

This annual event is held on the last Wednesday and Thursday of August. It provides manufacturers an opportunity to exhibit and demonstrate farm machinery, equipment and allied industries to primary producers, city and overseas visitors. Approximately 20,000 visitors flock to Dowerin over these two days and it gets bigger every year. 2014 saw the 50th Anniversary of the Field Days which is an amazing accomplishment for the Dowerin Events Management and the community of Dowerin.

Wildflowers

Dowerin has several reserves within the Shire which are home to an array of wildflowers, native bush and abundant wildlife. Most wildflowers can be observed between July and October, but as wildflowers are heavily dependent on rainfall during winter, the more rain, the more wildflowers there are to enjoy. Hotspots include Tin Dog Creek Reserve, Namelcatchem Reserve and Minnivale Reserve. Some orchid species spotted include Donkey, Bunny, Leek and Spider. Many species of flowering wattles, grevillea and hakea can be seen on road verges and throughout the reserves, while pink, white and yellow everlastings can sometimes form a carpet of colour from late August through to October.

WYALKATCHEM



186km north-east of Perth

'Welcome to Wylie' you'll hear the locals say! The friendly country spirit is alive and well here at this 'strange name, beaut place'. An easy two hour drive from Perth via Northam or Toodyay, Wyalkatchem lies east of Perth on the Toodyay-Goomalling-Merredin Road, along the popular Pioneers' Pathway and Wheatbelt Way self drive routes.

The first recorded exploration was in 1846, guided by local Aboriginals. Settlers first arrived in 1904 however it was not until 1908 that the townsite was officially declared.

The district is a thriving grain and sheep farming region, producing some 895,500 kilograms of wool and 115,000 tonnes of wheat annually. Wyalkatchem is well served by a district high school, medical centre, golf course and many active community and sporting clubs, and an event calendar that includes April's Wyalkatchem Fair.

PLACES OF INTEREST

CBH Museum

Wyalkatchem is renowned as the 'cradle of bulk handling' in WA, it was here the first delivery of bulk wheat was received from Korrelocking on 9 November 1931. The original wheat bin attracts many visitors and the CBH Museum houses an impressive collection of early farming equipment including the 'Waterloo Boy' - one of the first John Deere tractors and one of a few remaining in Australia.

Wyalkatchem Town Heritage Walk

The town boasts many fine historical buildings from the early 1900s, including the Railway Station, Wyalkatchem Town Hall and the School Master's House. A Wyalkatchem Town Heritage Walk leaflet is available at the visitor centre.

Old School House

Visit the old school house and see life from a bygone era, it houses the old switchboard from the telephone exchange and various old printing machines. Viewing by appointment. Contact Pat Jones Tel: (08) 9681 1036 or Wendy Begley Tel: (08) 9681 1397.

Walk-A-Wyal Tracks

Nature lovers are well catered for with the Walk-A-Wyal Tracks in and around the Wyalkatchem townsite. Located at the eastern end of Piesse Street, this walk trail consists of three different tracks, marked by yellow, blue and red triangles where you can observe unique flora and fauna in the peaceful surrounds of some of the oldest bushland reserves in Western Australia.

Cowcowing Lake

Cowcowing Lake lies 26km to the north of town on the Wyalkatchem-Koorda Road. The lake gives its name to Cowcowing siding. The lake covers an area of 15,000 hectares and on rare occasions when the lake is full, locals use it to water ski. The Cowcowing Cemetery is on the edge of the Wyalkatchem-Koorda Road.

Yorkrakine Rock

A 30 minute drive south of town on the Tammin Road, Yorkrakine Rock is a spectacular granite outcrop rising 341 metres and covering an area of some 160 hectares, making it an ideal spot for picnics (toilets available) and bush walking. During spring, the reserve comes alive with stunning wildflowers and orchids.

Korrelocking Reserve

Site 4 on the 'Wheatbelt Way' self drive trail, Korrelocking Reserve lies 7km east of town along the Nungarin-Wyalkatchem Road. The reserve covers 259 hectares of pristine bushland with some great examples of Salmon Gums and Gimlets. It is a picturesque picnic spot especially during wildflower season, with tables, toilets, interpretative signage, marked walk trail and pioneer well. Some 44 bird species have been recorded at the reserve including Pacific Heron, Black-shouldered Kite, Whistling Kite, Little Eagle, Black-tailed native-hen and Long-billed Corella.

Historic Wyalkatchem Well

Site 5 on the 'Wheatbelt Way' self drive trail, Wyalkatchem Well (commonly known as 'Wyalkatchem Tank') is situated on the outskirts of town, some 10 metres from the south side of the Goldfields Road within the Wyalkatchem Golf Course. Wyalkatchem Well is unique with its rectangular shaped granite walls, constructed by John Haywood for the Toodyay Roads Board in 1881 and later utilised as a water source for early steam locomotives.

Where to Stay

Wyalkatchem is an ideal base to explore nearby attractions. The town also has a caravan park, hotel, barracks and self-contained short stay homes. Contact the visitor centre for further information. A register of local businesses and contact details is available on the Shire's website.

TRAYNING



235km east of Perth

Trayning lies 235 kilometres east of Perth on the Goomalling/Merredin Road, along the Wheatbelt Way self drive trail and is mostly a wheat farming community, with coarse grains and various livestock.

There are three townships in the Shire, Trayning, Kununoppin and Yelbeni and the area has many natural granite outcrops, native birds, insects, reptiles, woodlands and stunning panoramas of wildflowers in season, all easily accessible.

The name 'Trayning' was given to the district after the 'Trayning Well' and the name for the well was derived from two Aboriginal names 'Durri-iring' or 'Duranning', meaning to 'to crawl', and 'a camping place'.

Trayning offers some great recreational experiences to visitors including the Trayning swimming pool, gymnasium, tennis courts, playground, skate park and BMX track.

Come and enjoy a game of bowls at the Trayning Community Sports Club, or play a round of golf at the Yelbeni Golf Club just 16kms from town.

PLACES OF INTEREST

Billyacatting Hill

On the Shire's eastern boundary, 27 kilometres east of Trayning this 2,500 hectare flora and fauna reserve is a nature lover's delight, especially during wildflower season.

Yarragin Rock

24 kilometres north-east of Trayning, Yarragin Rock consists of twin monoliths rising from a flat granite outcrop and is visible from a great distance.

Gnamma Holes

Gnamma holes are located 18 kilometres north of Trayning. Birds and other wildlife frequent the area and the perimeters near the gnamma holes are also good places to search for orchids and other wildflowers during springtime.

Trayning Centenary Walk Trail

Starting at Railway Street Centenary Wall and winding through the Tree Library, the walk includes 15 local historical sites situated throughout the town, each sign posted with information and photos of the site's individual history.

Yelbeni Heritage Museum

The township of Yelbeni has its own Heritage Museum situated 14 kilometres west of Trayning. The Museum provides an insight into the region's pioneering days.

Trayning Well

Situated on the old road from Goomalling to the Goldfields. The name first appeared on surveyor John Forrest's map in 1869. 4.5km north of the present townsite on the Bencubbin/Kellerberrin Road (Lot 10541), the well was gazetted on 20 December 1906. It is believed the well was constructed by Charles Adams, who was responsible for the stone lining of a number of wells on the Goldfields route.

Where to Stay

Trayning is an 'RV Friendly Town' and accommodation options include the Shire of Trayning Caravan Park with excellent facilities including powered drive thru sites, modern ablutions, campers' kitchen, full time caretakers and chemical dump point, and is situated within close proximity to the town's recreation services. For bookings Tel: 0428 997 156.

The Trayning Hotel and Motel is situated on Railway Street, offering motel style accommodation, refreshments and meals.

300km north-east of Perth

Mukinbudin is situated along the Wheatbelt Way self drive trail. This is a friendly and vibrant community which gets plenty of positive feedback for its welcoming people and facilities. Along the Wheatbelt Way, explore the massive granite outcrops of Mukinbudin and the Central Wheatbelt. This self drive route includes Beringbooding Rock, which has one of the largest rock water catchment tanks in Australia, built in 1937 and holding two and a quarter million gallons. Beringbooding has an amazing balancing boulder, a huge gnamma hole and some of the Kalamaia tribe's paintings of hands in a cave at the rear of the rock.

PLACES OF INTEREST

Elachbutting Rock

Nearby is Elachbutting Rock; explore this massive granite outcrop with its spectacular waves, tunnel and cavern, prospector's well, and superb wildflowers during the season.

Wattoning Historical Site

This was a significant historical settlement used for carting water at the turn of the century. Precious water was carted from a gnamma hole (water lifted by bucket tied to a rope),

a soak and two wells constructed by early pastoralists, skilfully lined with rocks. These wells are still in good condition today. Three lonely graves of two babies and an earlier pioneer remind us of time gone by. The remains of an early homestead with fruit trees can be found nearby. This site has excellent interpretation signage.

Weira Reserve

Just 20km east of the Mukinbudin townsite is Weira Reserve. Here you will see a breakaway area with gnamma hole. Barbecue, toilets and picnic facilities are available. Seek out the shy native orchids in the damp areas of the bush trail, also the Red Capped Robin.

Wildflowers

Throughout the Shire you will find numerous types of wildlife and flora. When flowering, the Kunzea pulchella can be found in both the red and white varieties as well as native orchids such as Cowslip, Patricia's Spider and Donkey Orchids, the 'Silver Princess' (Eucalyptus caesia) and one sided bottlebrush flower profusely. Depending on seasonal conditions, carpets of small pink everlasting can be seen throughout the Shire.

Pope's Hill

Situated 8kms east of the townsite, this site honours and tells the story of Colonel Harold Pope, John Mulqueeny and the

returning soldiers who contributed greatly to the development of farming land in the Lake Brown area, which was the first large scale Soldier Settlement Scheme in Western Australia. Unique Grain Storage Silo, Mukinbudin Men's Shed, Goodchild's Gateway and Cleomine are all worth a visit.

Mukinbudin 1950's Working Farm Shed

The Mukinbudin Men's Shed was established in 2009, hosting the inaugural Men's Shed Conference in September 2009. It is now home to several restored farm machinery items and a venue for many community workshops, sundowners and other events. The Men's Shed is centrally located in town near the town's heritage grain silo. Drop in and view the nostalgic farm displays or take a tour and enjoy a cuppa. Opening hours do vary but if closed refer to contact details listed on the entrance.

BENCUBBIN



270km north-east of Perth

The town of Bencubbin is the main centre within the Shire and is a vibrant community which enjoys a relaxed, country lifestyle. The name Bencubbin comes from an Aboriginal word for Mt Marshall.

There are many original buildings in the town including the hotel, Sandalwood Shops, Bank of NSW, Old Police Station and Bencubbin School that were all built between 1911 and 1929.

PLACES OF INTEREST

Marshall Rock

Discovered in 1836, Marshall Rock provides 360° views of the surrounding productive cropping land, Lake McDermott, Bencubbin, Welbungin and Wiacubbing Hill.

Pergande Sheep Yards and Homestead

2 kilometres south of Marshall Rock you will find the remains of an original and prominent homestead of the Pergande family. Here, sheep yards constructed entirely of granite slabs are open for visitors to visit with information boards telling the history of the family.

Pioneer Wells

A trip back in time helps you imagine how families carted water from these wells for their livestock and for personal use, before the establishment of the water pipelines.

Sandalwood Interpretation Centre

Located in the Bencubbin Community Resource Centre on the main street, call in and read about the sandalwood industry past and present and check out the sandalwood products available for purchase. Outside you can find the Sandalwood Dray. This was built to recognise the sandalwooders as the true pioneers of Bencubbin and the Mt Marshall District.

Wildflowers

When good winter rains are received, the district blooms with a diverse range of wildflowers between July and October.

BEACON



300km north-east of Perth

Beacon has the great feature of being the farthest north-easterly town in the Wheatbelt. As such, it is not a typical Wheatbelt location, adjacent to extensive native bushland and pastoral country. Within the Shire there are numerous granite and other rock formations, many of which have been harnessed for the collection of rainwater.

PLACES OF INTEREST

Datjoin Rock

A unique rock formation located east of Beacon. Also see Datjoin Well and picnic area at the location.

Billiburning Rock

This reserve provides excellent views of farmland and pastoral country. View a pioneer well and gnamma hole.

Beagleys Breakaway

An interesting rock formation dating back millions of years, adjoining the Tampu Well Reserve.

Pioneer Wells

Tampu and Datjoin wells provide beautiful picnic spots in wildflower season.

Approximately 3 hours' drive north-east of Perth and situated along the popular 'Wheatbelt Way' self drive trail, Koorda's main industries include wheat, coarse grain and sheep farming. During springtime experience remarkable wildflower displays, with some species unique to the area. Koorda is famously referred to as 'Corn Dolly Land', attracting sightseers wanting to learn more about this ancient tradition of creating 'dollies' from stalks and husks of corn.

The town offers great facilities for visitors to enjoy, from its wonderful Wheatbelt scenery, local attractions and museum and drive in theatre, to sporting recreational services such as golf course, tennis courts, lawn bowls, children's playground, skate park and much, much more.

PLACES OF INTEREST

Granite Outcrops

Near to town there are several granite outcrops including, Mollerin Rock, Newcarlbeon, Badgerin Rock and Moningarin. These picturesque outcrops, each have their own peculiar mini-environment of magnificent wildflowers including the Koorda Rose, dozens of bird varieties and native animals including kangaroos and echidna. Most have picnic and/or barbecue facilities. Mollerin Rock and Newcarlbeon also have toilet facilities. Moningarin has the extra bonus of native gnamma holes.

Museums

Koorda boasts two Museums, the first taking its theme from the building's origin as a hospital in the years before World War II. It is well worth a visit to view the interesting collection of antique medical and surgical equipment that was used in the former hospital ward. There is also a large display of early farming machinery and pioneer homestead artefacts.

The Motor and Military Museum has an extensive private collection of motor and military memorabilia and where you can get sit down and have a lovely cuppa.

Koorda Native Flora Reserve

Located 16 kilometres from town on the Mulji Road, features many different species of native flora and wildflowers in season. There is a spectacular display between July and November when patches of red, pink lavender, gold and blue add bright contrast to the greens of bush and farmland.

Koorda Drive In Theatre

One of only three left in Western Australia, the Koorda Drive In has recently been given a 'retro' renovation in the cafe area, and a brand new digital system has been installed to enhance the picture quality. With new release movies shown, the Koorda Drive In is truly a unique and memorable experience.

Koorda Swimming Pool

The Koorda Swimming Pool, consisting of one large and two small swimming pools, celebrates its 50th birthday in 2017. Open from November to April, the facilities include a BBQ area with seating, and plenty of grassed shaded areas to enjoy.

Koorda 100 years Celebrations

In February 2017 the Koorda township will be 100 years old. Centenary celebrations will be held throughout the year with a variety of events and shows being held in and around Koorda. More information and updates can be found at www.koorda.wa.gov.au

172km north of Perth

Moora is situated on the banks of the Moore River. In its virgin state, this area was a large salmon gum forest and many of the attractive trees still remain. Moora has many parks, gardens, heritage buildings and icons.

Moora is located less than 2 hours drive north of Perth. It is a thriving town strategically located between two of Western Australia's most popular tourism attractions – New Norcia, Australia's only monastic town, and the natural wonder of the Pinnacles in Nambung National Park near Cervantes.

Moora is the largest inland service centre between Perth and Geraldton, providing services to a population catchment of 6,000 residents within a 100km radius. Army Campsites

Moora played host to a large number of soldiers during World War II. An operational unit was based at Berkshire Valley and numerous other units were stationed around the district.

Discover Golden Horizons

This regional trail runs through Moora, Watheroo and Miling. For a copy of the brochure visit the Moora Community Resource Centre.

Moora Town Walk

This fascinating walk trail leads to Moora's historic buildings and points of interest including the Moora Town Clock. This stunning clock

was designed by local school students with the design then translated and constructed into a magnificent stained glass feature by local artists.

Moora Arts & Crafts

A variety of locally made and crafted gifts are available from pottery to jams and pickles.

Murals

Moora is on the 'Painted Road'. There are several murals in Moora relating to specific historic and regional events.

Moora Wildflower Drive

Moora is the official start of Wildflower Country. The Shire stands on the junction of two important and very different botanical districts. There are many other attractive routes around Moora for you to discover.

Carnaby Cockatoo Interpretive Walk Trail

The interpretative walk trail currently extends between the two town bridges and Candy Bush Reserve. The Carnaby Cockatoo Interpretive Walk Trail plays a major role in educating the community about the conservation of the Carnaby's Cockatoo, the importance of the salmon gums, and Moora's flora and fauna.

Koojan Salmon Gum Reserve Walk Trail

The trail is located 18km south of the Moora townsite on the Moora-Bindoon Road. It is a designated rest stop and offers the traveller a perfect leg stretch opportunity. The trail depicts the significance of the local history, agriculture, flora and fauna of Koojan.

Moora Museum

If you are looking to view the heritage of the district arrange a visit to view the displays. Viewings can be arranged by phoning Kaye Lewis, (08) 9651 1372 or mobile 0447 511 372.

Watheroo Station Tavern

This 100 year old Station Tavern is the local hotel which serves excellent meals. The Tavern also has a unique display of historical artefacts.

Watheroo National Park and Jingemias Cave

The National Park was established in 1955 with an area covering 1634 hectares. The park is very rich in many different kinds of wildflowers, and Jingemias Cave has a shady picnic site. The cave is formed in chert, an unsealed rock that leads to a vegetation community in the hill that is very different from the surrounding areas.

Moora Community Resource Centre

Moora Community Resource Centre is the local Tourist Information Centre. It offers an opportunity for one-on-one local information and stocks a variety of brochures and maps to peruse and take away. Moora CRC also has giftware, postcards and souvenirs for sale as mementos of your stay. A range of office services such as faxing, photocopying and internet access are available for a small fee. 42km east of Moora

Miling is the first true Wheatbelt town that the traveller encounters on the Great Northern Highway as they venture north of Perth. It is a small but friendly community whose focus is predominantly on wheat and sheep farming in the surrounding area. Miling is the terminus of one of WA's most scenic railway lines.

The most obvious landmark within the town is the grain receival complex (CBH). This facility handles in excess of one hundred thousand tonnes of wheat, barley and lupins per year; making Miling one of the larger inland receival points in the state.



36km north of Moora

The name Watheroo is derived from the Aboriginal word 'Wardo' meaning 'little bird', the Willy Wagtail, or 'Wardoro' meaning water. This name was given to the spring of water which made this spot centre for man, bird and beast.

The Watheroo Wildflower Drive is well worth a look as it features one of the only patches of Rose Mallee in the world.



McIntosh Park

The site of the first fatal commercial plane crash in WA is now the Pithara Speedway, situated just off Great Northern Hwy at Pithara.

Petrudor Rocks

A very attractive picnic location during winter/spring with good wildflowers and a lovely natural water pool following adequate winter rains.

Xantippe Tank

The concrete tank was constructed in the 1920s to capture the natural water run off from the granite rocks. This site can be found on the Dalwallinu-Kalannie Road.

Rabbit Proof Fence and Boundary Rider's Waterhole

Situated on the Rabbit Proof Fence Road, the No. 2 Rabbit-Proof Fence is still visible, as well as one of the original water holes blasted for the sole use of the Boundary Rider who maintained the fence.

Miamoon Reserve

A popular wildflower area for everlastings and orchids in season. Located approximately 17 kilometres west of Wubin, there is also a gnamma hole in the flat granite rocks.

(Open daily 10am to 3pm Jun to mid Oct, subject to volunteers). The heritage listed Wubin Wheatbin Museum depicts the history of grain handling through photos, models and artefacts. It also tells the story of Gus Liebe, who after distinguishing himself as a master builder in Perth (His Majesty's Theatre and many others), successfully turned his hand to farming with his partner Wilhelm Klein. The Museum's Machinery Annexe houses a magnificent display of vintage motor vehicles and machinery; the collection of one local farmer. An on demand DVD tells the story of

the No. 2 Rabbit Proof Fence and of Richard Anketell, former Superintendent of the fence. Visit www.wheatbinmuseum.com.au for more information.

An extensive rock and mineral collection is available to view in the Tourist Centre in the old railway station building.

Buntine Rocks

This site is 3 kilometres from the town of Buntine. A large rock in a vast nature reserve, it offers a magnificent view of the farming countryside from the top. An inviting picnic site with wildflowers in mid winter to spring.

Jibberding Reserve

A rest area off the Great Northern Highway 25 kilometres from Wubin, pretty displays of pink, white and yellow everlastings in season.

Cailbro Mudbrick School

This preserved one roomed school from the 1940s, featuring a historical photo display is 33 kilometres from Wubin.

Wreath Lechenaultia

This unusual flower can usually be found in a number of locations in the Shire east of Wubin from August up to early October.

Perenjori is home to the \$2 billion Karara Iron Ore Project as well as several smaller mining projects.

View an endless range of wildflowers including everlasting and flora and fauna from August to October, and be in awe of the unique Wreath Lechenaultia in September and October. Perenjori is also renowned for its wide variety of rare native spring orchids.

Perenjori offers a relaxed stop-over for travellers, whether at a powered site under shady trees, self contained chalet at the caravan park, short stay smart house or a comfortable room at the historical hotel. Bookings are recommended.

Church of St Joseph

Rothsay Heritage Trail and John Forrest Lookout

For a full day round trip of sightseeing: Work your way east of Perenjori from Caron Dam to Camel Soak and Mongers Lake, which takes you through pastoral and mining country to the John Forrest Lookout, with impressive views across the countryside. A little further out is Rothsay townsite and abandoned mine, as well as historical grave sites. At Caron Dam there is a natural catchment area, with a lovely picnic spot and free overnight camping.

The Perenjori Peoples Pathway provides an opportunity for visitors to explore the main street of the townsite.

ESPERANCE & The Coast



In stark contrast to the red earth of the Outback, the brilliant blue water and snow-white beaches of Esperance and the southern coast provide a spectacular coastal backdrop to a region of magnificent national parks and unspoilt marine playgrounds.

In this pristine and almost magical wilderness lies a profusion of plant and animal life, as well as a stunning 'necklace' - a string of close to 110 islands in crystal clear water just off the shoreline.

Esperance is the main township - a coastal jewel nestled along a stretch of magnificent, largely untouched coastline. It forms an ideal base from which to explore the natural wonders of this region in the Golden Outback.

Begin by cruising the paradise that is the Recherche Archipelago. Around the islands you'll come face to face with dolphins, whales, seals and seabirds. Visitors can spend time on Woody Island as part of a day cruise enjoying the scenic views and excellent walking trails.

Just off Cape Arid is Middle Island that has become famous for its year 'round rich pink Lake Hillier, accessible by short charter flight.

Back on the mainland, the region's stunning national parks are not to be missed. Cape Le Grand National Park is perhaps the most popular, thanks to breathtaking coastal scenery, rugged granite peaks and sweeping heathlands.

The Fitzgerald River National Park is similarly impressive, especially for its incredible assortment of plant and animal life. The Park is known as one of the most bio-diverse flora regions in the world, harbouring 1,900 beautiful and bizarre species of flowering plants. The numbers represent nearly twenty per cent of Western Australia's total plant species. Ravensthorpe and Hopetoun are both gateways to this national park.


The Golden Outback's coastal strip is also a gateway to the Nullarbor Plain. The plain includes one of the country's most important road arteries linking east and west. From Norseman you commence an amazing journey eastward, experiencing attractions including, blowholes, the Eyre Bird Observatory and the old Eucla Telegraph Station ruins.

EXPLORING ESPERANCE

Exploring Esperance and its surrounds provides a fascinating mix of local history, heritage, and breathtaking natural beauty.

Esperance Waterfront - Enjoy a coffee, or leisurely stroll along the newly developed foreshore. More than a kilometre of the ocean-front by the town centre is beautifully landscaped with walking paths, exercise equipment, public artworks, state of the art playgrounds, BBQ facilities, picnic shelters and beach access.

Cannery Arts Centre - In this premier exhibition space in central town area, you'll see touring exhibitions, studios, and art and craft shops featuring local works for sale.

Esperance Stonehenge - Come see a full scale replica of UK's Stonehenge set on a hill with vistas of the bay and farmland. Tea, coffee, soft drinks and ice cream available.

Municipal Museum - As one of Western Australia's outstanding regional museums, this one exhibits the world's largest and most comprehensive displays of Skylab (the first American space station) and the Sanko Harvest (the largest diveable wreck off the Australian coast).

Museum Park Village - Enjoy a fascinating trip through history with this collection of historical buildings that house art, craft and design shops and Aboriginal art gallery. A heritage walk booklet is available at the Esperance Visitor Centre. Don't miss the Sunday markets regularly held in the village.

Adventureland Park - A great spot to bring your kids to enjoy the various playgrounds, mini golf, feed the ducks or just have a ride on the mini steam train (October 1 to April 30). Located adjacent to Taylors Beach Bar and Café.

Mermaid Leather - See the process that transforms fish skins into unique leather products such as keyrings, purses and jewellery. Factory tours and showroom, items for sale. Open Tue to Sun, 2pm-5pm.

The Section Glass Gallery - Visit Cindy Poole's kiln formed glass studio, café and gallery with handmade souvenirs and artworks, also part of the Great Ocean Drive. Open Monday to Saturday 10am to 4pm, Sunday 1pm to 4pm. Lot 5 Longbottom Lane.

Dempster Homestead - Built in 1867 this was the home of Esperance's most famous pioneer family. It is privately owned but can be viewed from the road at 155 Dempster Street.

The Great Ocean Drive - This 40 kilometre drive is an excellent start for visitors, highlighting the Rotary Lookout and Twilight Beach among many other stunning beaches as well as the Ten Mile Beach Wind Farm.

Bandy Creek Boat Harbour - The hub of the region's commercial fishing industry and a great place to drop a line in the water.

Helms Arboretum - Acres of a diverse range of botanical species. Wildflowers prolific in season, picnic areas and walking trails.

Ten Mile Beach Wind Farm - 15 kilometres west of Esperance, this is one of Australia's most advanced wind/gas power systems. Opened in 2003, it sits alongside the Nine Mile Lagoon Wind Farm and

together these two wind farms generate more than 25% of Esperance's electricity needs.

Recherche Archipelago - The 110 islands offer perfect spots for fishing, diving, snorkelling and sailing. This natural treasure is a haven for a variety of wildlife, as well as a playground for holidaymakers. Fishing charters and island cruises available.

Kepwari Wetland Walk Trail - Located a 5 minute drive from Esperance, the walk trail is 3.6 kilometres one-way, offering interpretative displays to educate visitors about the importance of the wetlands.

Lake Hillier - Take a charter flight over the vibrant pink lake on Middle Island, just off Cape Arid. Tel: 0428 912 210.

Lucky Bay Brewing - Sample local handcraft beer at Esperance's newest micro-brewery. Call 0447 631 115 for opening times.

Patroni Olive Farm - See a real olive farm! On Fisheries Road. Recommended to call on (08) 9076 1101 to confirm opening times.

Mount Ridley - 75 kilometres north of Esperance (4WD access). See ancient Aboriginal cave art and a 'Wave Rock', perhaps climb to the top and enjoy amazing views!

Gibson Soak Pub - Just 20 kilometres north of Esperance, it's the place to go for a good feed. No one leaves the Soak hungry!

Yirri Grove - Olive farm, shop, restaurant and café located in Myrup. Open Fri to Mon 10am-4pm.

Yabby Farm - Discover the yabby, a uniquely Australian freshwater crustacean, on a tour of this family operated farm (free tour with any purchase). Contact Steve or Jackie on (08) 9071 3675 to arrange a visit.

Art in Esperance - Ask the Visitor Centre for a list of the various galleries in and around town.

Esperance Mechanical Restoration Group - Come and see restored and under restoration stationary engines, tractors, motor bikes, vehicles etc. Open day at the shed on Mclean Road, every 4th Sunday of the month from 10am to 4pm (entry by donation).

Esperance Bird & Animal Park and Café - 10 minutes from town on the way to the airport. A great animal exhibit with café. Open Thu-Mon 9am to 4pm. Daily over school holidays.

Port Tours - Saturday at 1:30pm, this bus tour run by APEX leaves from the port viewing area. Gold coin donation.

Bruce Malloch - Professional artist who depicts the desolate inland towns and landscapes as well as the people who inhabit them. Mobile 0427 694 492.

Woody Island - A popular wilderness retreat located in the Recherche Archipelago. Cruises to the island expected to recommence from Esperance over the 2017 summer period.

EAST & WEST OF ESPERANCE

Duke of Orleans Bay and Condingup 80km east of Esperance

This area is located between Cape Le Grand and Cape Arid National Parks, and is often described as having the best beaches in the world. The contrast of the snowy white beach sands washed by turquoise blue waters and framed with a backdrop of rugged granite peaks is truly unforgettable. Wharton Beach in particular is a sight to behold.

A fishing charter operator and caravan park is located in the sheltered Duke of Orleans Bay and close by.

Condungup Tavern - 70kms east of Esperance on the way to Duke of Orleans Bay, café/restaurant with beer garden, coffee and cake all day, lunch and dinner; open 7 days.

Munglinup Beach and Oldfield Estuary 120km west of Esperance

Munglinup Beach Road has picturesque views of the winding inlet which is both scenic and also offers small boat access for fishing. The Oldfield Estuary is a perfect place for canoeing, or you can take a stroll along the walking trail. The Munglinup Beach Holiday Park is 3km from Munglinup Beach.

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ESPERANCE & COASTAL NATIONAL PARKS

The national parks in the coastal region are now part of the Great South West Edge landscape. All five parks offer magnificent scenery and are some of the largest remaining wilderness areas.

The coastal parks with towering granite peaks and brilliant blue waters contrast sharply with the sandplains and distinctive vegetation of those further inland.

Entry fees may apply to national parks and do not include camping fees. See page 102.

CAPE LE GRAND NATIONAL PARK

Wild coastal scenery, rugged granite peaks and sweeping heathlands. Wide sandy beaches and bays give way to heath-covered sandplains, with swamps and freshwater pools.

Massive rock outcrops form an impressive chain of peaks, the result of erosion and movements over 600 million years. The area supports a variety of plant and animal life.

Location and travel time:

50 kilometres south-east of Esperance. 45 minute drive.

Activities:

Walking, camping, boating, picnicking, sightseeing, swimming, fishing.

Walk Trails:

Coastal Trail is 15 kilometres one way; 6 - 8 hours walking. Walk may be broken into 4 shorter sections:

- **Le Grand Beach - Hellfire Bay**
Allow 2 - 3 hours, hard going.
- **Hellfire Bay - Thistle Cove**
Allow 2 hours, hard going.
- **Thistle Cove - Lucky Bay**
Allow 40 minutes, easy.
- **Lucky Bay - Rossiter Bay**
Allow 2 - 3 hours, medium.

Frenchman's Peak

3 kms return. Allow 2 hours, hard walk.

Le Grand Heritage Trail

1 km circuit. Allow 40 minutes, easy.

Facilities:

BBQs, toilets, campsite, picnic areas, shade shelters, NO drinking water. 2 camping grounds, coffee caravan.

FITZGERALD RIVER NATIONAL PARK

\$40 million has been spent improving roads and viewing areas in this stunning national park, containing nearly 20% of WA's plant species.

Lying between Hopetoun and Bremer Bay, surrounding the inlets of the Fitzgerald, Gairdner, Phillips and Hamersley Rivers, the park has some 209 species of birds and over 1,900 species of flowering plants. Migrating whales can be seen June to October. The amazing variety of vegetation also provides a haven for native animals.

Location and travel time:

193 kilometres west of Esperance. 2 hour drive.

Activities:

Sightseeing, walking, camping, canoeing, fishing. In winter, southern right whales may be spotted from the cliffs at Point Ann.

Walk Trails:

- **East Mount Barren** 3 hrs, medium to hard.
- **No Tree Hill** 3 kilometres, easy.
- **Twertup 'Horrie and Dorri'** 1-2 hours.
- **Point Ann Heritage Trail** 1 hour.
- **West Mount Barren** 1-2 hrs, moderate/easy.
- **West Beach Point** 1 hour.

Facilities:

BBQs, picnic areas, toilets, campsites. NO drinking water available.

STOKES NATIONAL PARK

Beautiful coastal and inlet scenery in this interesting estuarine national park. Stokes Inlet lies in a relatively deep valley with high dunes on either side. Plant and animal life of Stokes Inlet is typical of an estuarine environment.

Location and travel time:

Approx 80 kms west of Esperance. 1 hr drive.

Activities:

Birdwatching, camping, fishing, canoeing, walking.

Walk Trails:

- **Heritage Trail** - 4.3 kilometres return, easy.

Facilities:

Two camping areas near the inlet, with toilets and gas BBQs. NO water or power.

CAPE ARID NATIONAL PARK

This large and particularly scenic park is home to more than 160 bird species and is involved in their conservation. The park's walking trails are an excellent place to look for birds. The park overlaps the boundary of the Eremaean botanical province and includes beaches and the Thomas River and estuary.

Location and travel time:

Approximately 120 kilometres east of Esperance. 1.5 hour drive.

Activities:

Bushwalking, camping, birdwatching, whale spotting, picnicking, fishing.

Walk Trails:

- **Len Otte Nature Trail** -
1 kilometre return, around 1 hour.
Features views over the park and a close look at the varied plant and animal life.
- **Tagon Coastal Walk** -
7 kms return, allow 4 hours. Views over coastline, southern right whales in season.

• Mt Ragged Walk -

3 kms return, 3 hours. Stiff walk to the top of Tower Peak.

Facilities:

Campgrounds, bush toilets, gas BBQs. NO drinking water available. Camp fees apply.

PEAK CHARLES NATIONAL PARK

This ancient granite peak and its companion, Peak Eleanora, provide sweeping views over dry and distant sandplain heath and salt lake systems.

Location and travel time:

100 kms inland from Esperance. 1.5 hour drive.

Activities:

Follow the walking trail. Climb Peak Charles.

Facilities:

Apart from toilets at designated camping areas, no other facilities. Visitors should carry water.







The Fitzgerald Coast is situated between Albany and Esperance. Come and enjoy a temperate Mediterranean climate with beautiful sunny winter days and cool summer nights. Explore ancient mountain ranges, rocky hills, rugged river valleys, vast sand plains, estuaries and large inlets.

The region encompasses the Ravensthorpe Shire and is approximately two-thirds natural bushland. This includes the Fitzgerald River National Park, Ravensthorpe Range reserves and vacant crown land. The many different landforms provide a variation of rocks and soil nutrients to promote a wide variety of plants.

Internationally recognised as a UNESCO listed Biosphere, the region is reputed to have more plants for its size than any other similar area in the world. Wildflowers are in evidence all year round and springtime is best.

After exploring the natural surrounds, visitors can enjoy the relaxed pace of Ravensthorpe, Munglinup and Hopetoun.

Hire cars are available in Ravensthorpe and should be pre-booked to avoid disappointment.

A recommended route is the Fitzgerald Coast loop. Start in Ravensthorpe, travel down to Hopetoun and then to Munglinup via the sealed Jerdacuttup Road. Travelling from Hopetoun to Esperance is 188km via Jerdacuttup Road, a good day trip option.

FITZGERALD RIVER NATIONAL PARK

Covering an area of 330,000 hectares it is one of the largest and most botanically significant national parks in Australia.

It boasts a magnificent coastline of rocky headlands white sandy beaches, inlets and striking ranges. Situated between Hopetoun and Bremer Bay it surrounds the Fitzgerald, Gordon, Hamersley and Culham inlets. Part of the Fitzgerald Biosphere it's recognised for its rich and unique biodiversity, the world's most important Mediterranean ecosystem.

Recently reopened the new Fitzgerald River National Park features fully surfaced coastal roads and lookouts with spectacular views. A new interpretive area has been created with some of the interpretive displays being state of the art. As you drive along stop at the many beaches and undertake walks along the numerous trails. A fully resurfaced Hamersley Drive now takes you to the spectacular and remote Hamersley Inlet.

In spring, this national park offers a magnificent show of wildflowers and the variety of textures and colours will amaze you. Endemic flora species include the spectacular Royal Hakea, Qualup Bell, Barrens regalia and Sepulcralis.

Migrating and breeding whales can be seen from vantage points within the park from June until October at Point Ann viewing platform.

Generally many coastal park roads are accessible by 2WD and the park interior is rugged with mountainous terrain and requires 4WD or walking.

Walking visitors should ensure footwear is clean to prevent dieback, preferably sprayed with 70% methylated spirits.

HIGHLIGHTS TO SEE AND DO

- **Barrens Lookout** located on the eastern side of East Mt Barren has a viewing platform with universal access. Short walk amongst spectacular wildflowers overlooking Barrens Beach, Culham Inlet and Hopetoun.
- **Experience Hamersley Drive & Sepulcralis Hill Lookout** and be amazed by the abundant wildflowers all year round including the endemic Royal Hakea and Qualup Bell.
- **Barrens Beach** has 200 metres of squeaky white sand complimented by rocky outcrops and reef. Swim, fish, snorkel and play the day away. Site includes interpretive signage, seating and toilet facilities.
- **Hamersley Inlet Campground** June 2014 saw the opening of a major upgrade to the park which included sealed roads to Hamersley campground, with toilet facilities, sheltered gas barbecue, enjoy close access to Hiking Trails, fishing and boating activities.

RAVENSTHORPE



The scenic drives in Ravensthorpe will be a highlight of your trip and should start with a visit to the Museum.

The stunning Ravensthorpe Range is a must to explore. With geological complexity, an abundance of plants, wildflowers and fauna, it is one of 34 recognised global biodiversity 'hot spots', the only one in Australia. It has long been recognised as an area of significant mineralisation with an extensive history of exploration and mining activity. Historically referred to as the Phillips River Goldfield, more than 90 gold and copper mines have operated at one time or another in the range since the 1890s. There is very little gold mining activity in the area now, but there are still prospects and mining operations sourcing nickel, cobalt, spodumene, pegmatite silver and gold.

Agriculture extends over and past the range, and is approximately one-third of the Ravensthorpe Shire. The productive farmland produces a variety of produce including: wheat, oats, barley, lupins, canola, field peas, beans, wool, cattle, sheep and to a lesser extent, honey, aquaculture (yabbies) and wildflowers.

The Ravensthorpe Museum is staffed by local volunteers and has a fantastic and comprehensive display on the history of the region. The Museum also offers great tourism information, with volunteers able to offer a wealth of local knowledge. Find brochures and maps for local hot spots and the surrounding region, located on Morgan's Street, most local businesses offer visitor brochures as well.

HIGHLIGHTS TO SEE AND DO

- **Farm Gate Art** is a great selection of crafts made from scrap steel off farms and are dotted around the landscape. A map of their location and an explanation of each work is available from local tourism information outlets.
- **Ceramic Pioneer mural** at Jubilee Park on the main street with playground and BBQ.
- **Ravensthorpe Painted Silos.** The artwork on the Ravensthorpe silos follows the flowering cycle of a Banksia, native to the region. World-renowned street artist Amok Island

created the mural throughout August and September 2016, taking 31 days to create the 25m high mural that is visible for miles in every direction. This project was brought to Ravensthorpe by CBH and FORM - not to be missed.

- **Archer Drive Lookout** 20kms return. Wildflowers, picturesque sweeping farmland views from the Ravensthorpe Range.
- **Elverdton Road** wildflowers line the south side of the road and 15km south of Ravensthorpe the Ethel Daw lookout is breathtaking.
- **Ravensthorpe Wildflower Show** held in mid-September each year the show has more than 600 labelled different species on display. You can enjoy guided 4WD tag a long tours, a guided heritage railway walk, Devonshire teas and local art exhibition. Visit www.wildflowersravensthorpe.org.au for information.
- **Mt Short Scenic Drive** 40kms return allow 2hrs. Highest point in Ravensthorpe Range 453m, picnicking, wildflowers, scenery, old gold mine, climb Mt Short.
- **Mt Madden Scenic Drive** 160kms return allow 5-6hrs. Pallarup Rocks picnic spot, large granite rock covering 20ha to explore, panoramic views, and wildflowers.
- **Railway Heritage Walk Trail.** A four-section walk track through natural bush. The original railway track was built to connect Ravensthorpe mines to the Hopetoun Port and operated from 1909 to 1935.
- **Ravensthorpe Range 4WD** fascinating 28km drive across Ravensthorpe Range, see new mining activity, wildflowers, mallee fowl and kangaroos.

MUNGLINUP



Secluded hideaways, Munglinup Beach and Oldfield Estuary.

The Oldfield Estuary area offers visitors plenty of activities including canoeing, small boating, kayaking, nature bush walks, wildflower viewing and fishing. Munglinup Beach forms a lagoon that is protected by a reef and here you can swim or snorkel, enjoy the underwater world or just relax on the beach. If you are looking for a secluded beach you needn't go any further, you'll find it here or just around the corner. Lake Shaster and the Oldfield Estuary are renowned havens for rare and unusual birds.

NORSEMAN & The Nullarbor

NORSEMAN Population 700



Situated at the crossroads of Highway's 1 and 94 in the Southern Goldfields, Norseman is the major centre in the Shire of Dundas that covers approximately 93,000 square kilometres and reaches as far as the WA/SA border making Norseman the gateway to Western Australia and the Nullarbor.

Gold was discovered in 1894 by prospector Laurie Sinclair when his horse Norseman went lame and Laurie discovered that the piece of rock lodged in Norseman's hoof was gold bearing. Excited by this Laurie continued his prospecting, resulting in a major find that sparked a gold rush and established a town that was named in honour of the horse. Gold has been mined ever since creating a long history of mining heritage.

The town has interesting historical displays to visit as well as a fascinating heritage drive trail, all telling stories of bygone social and mining history. Aside from gold, Norseman is also blessed with non-precious gemstone fields ideal for fossicking, great fun for individuals or families.

Timing your trip in early March will provide further excitement of a live Rock Drill competition and the epic Gold Fever Festival and Norseman Race Day.

Norseman sits in the beautiful country of the Ngadju, located at the heart of the Great Western Woodlands, the largest temperate woodland left in the world. Stunning scenery with many unique tree species, opportunities for camping, bush walking, visiting ancient granite

rock formations, enjoying the many species of wildlife and wildflowers and just embracing nature and its uniqueness all awaits you.

Nearby vast ancient salt lakes, the remnants of huge river systems from the ice age are quite intriguing. These offer excellent photo opportunities with the salt crusts forming odd shapes, shimmering mirages in the summer heat and eye catching sunsets or sunrises with the lakes as the foreground.

As you leave Norseman you embark on the epic Nullarbor journey with its timeless beauty, breathtaking scenery and the newest activity, the Nullarbor Links, the world's longest golf course. Nine holes are located within the Shire of Dundas. With so much to see and do we encourage you to stop, stay and explore.

PLACES OF INTEREST

Historical Collection

The newly restored museum is well worth a visit. It houses a superb collection of mining and early pioneer displays as well as exterior exhibits that include a large piece of Skylab.

The Tin Camels

Unique corrugated iron camels that stand in the Prinsep Street roundabout are a tribute to the camel trains that carried mail and freight in the early days.

Beacon Hill Lookout and Walk Trail

A 2 kilometre drive from the main street brings you to Beacon Hill a panoramic 360o view over the town and surrounding countryside. The wildflower season further enriches this stunning view.

Phoenix Tailings Dump

A majestic backdrop to the town resembling a topless pyramid that has been shaped by the weather. Today it still contains gold worth a considerable amount of money.

Granite Woodlands Discovery Trail

The trail from Norseman to Hyden features 16 interpretive sites that invite camping and bushwalking, viewing granite rock formations and a wildflower wonderland in spring.

Heritage Trail

The original Cobb and Co route this 28km self drive tourist trail is a pleasant bush track which features historical interpretive stopping points offering a window into the harshness of early mining life. It ends at the original Dundas townsite and the ancient Dundas Rocks.


Dundas Rocks




PLAY THE AWARD WINNING NULLARBOR LINKS GOLF COURSE

The GOLDFIELDS



The discovery of gold in Western Australia in the 1890s heralded a population explosion as fortune-seekers from around the globe descended on the Goldfields region to cash in on its natural bounty.

Life was rough and tough for these early gold diggers, with disease rife and lawlessness commonplace. And while multi-million dollar mining corporations have replaced the early diggers, the region retains the sense of adventure, the character and the romance of the early gold rush.

This is particularly true in Kalgoorlie-Boulder. Although the twin city is now a bustling and expanding place that offers a contemporary and cosmopolitan lifestyle, its collection of historical buildings, pubs, infamous Hay Street brothels and attractions provide a rich backdrop that spans more than a century of gold history.

To gain a taste for this gold rush history, start your journey in Kalgoorlie-Boulder by visiting the West Australian Museum at the top end of



Hannan Street or visit Hannans North Tourist Mine to wander the replica prospectors' village and marvel at the huge Haul Packs. For an appreciation of the sheer scale of modern day mining, visit the Super Pit, one of the largest open-cut mines in the world and forms part of the Golden Mile - said to be the richest square mile of gold bearing earth in the world.

Follow the Golden Quest Discovery Trail, which includes highlights such as the eerie Antony Gormley Sculptures decorating the white, sweeping salt plain at Lake Ballard, near Menzies, and the ghosts of the past at Leonora and Gwalia. Be sure to stop in at Ora Banda Historic Hotel and the Kookynie Grand Hotel for a cold beer in these traditional Aussie Outback pubs. Further along the trail is Laverton, the gateway to the Outback Way.

The gold rush story is evident in many small towns along the Discovery Trail, each one retaining some of that pioneering spirit. This is perhaps most evident at Coolgardie, which was founded in the late 1800s and offers character buildings that are reminiscent of its gold prospecting heyday.






The Historic Kalgoorlie Town Hall holds more than a century of Goldfields history and is home to the Kalgoorlie Boulder Pure Gold Visitor Centre, Goldfields Sporting Hall of Fame, the Claude Hotchin Art Bequest, the Goldfields War Museum and the Local History Archives. Discover the Kalgoorlie of old at the beautiful Kalgoorlie Town Hall, an impressive 1908 Edwardian-styled building with intricate pressed metal ceilings, chandeliers, sweeping staircase, theatre and extensive collection of art and memorabilia. Karlkurla Bushland Park

This 200 hectare natural re-growth bushland park comprises four kilometres of walk trails, a lookout, picnic tables, interpretive flora signage, and a wide variety of native plant species, including the sandalwood tree and wildflowers in season. The park is legacy of the 1970s Dust Abatement Policy established to re-vegetate land to reduce the dust storms that Kalgoorlie experienced.

Visitors to Western Australia's Goldfields find themselves astounded by the diversity and beauty of the region's landscape, flora and fauna. Discover this for yourself by visiting the impressive Goldfields national parks and nature reserves.

Goldfields Woodlands National Park

The Goldfields Woodlands National Park straddles the Great Eastern Highway 60 kilometres west of Coolgardie, running for another 40 kilometres beside the road.

Travelling time: One hour from Coolgardie.

Facilities: Visitor and camping areas at Victoria Rock and Boondi Rock. Information shelter, tables, toilets, camping sites, freshwater dam at Boondi, heritage trail, Holland Track, picnic sites.

What to do: Sightseeing, walking, photography, nature observation, birdwatching, swimming, yabbing, picnics, camping, 4WD trips.

Cave Hill's Cave and Wave Formation

Cave Hill is an excellent camping spot and is one of several large granite rock conservation reserves managed by DPAW.

Where is it: 90 kilometres south of Coolgardie.

Facilities: Information shelters, tables, barbecues, toilets, camping areas.

What to do: Sightseeing, walking, photography, nature observation, yabbing, picnics, camping, 4WD trips along the old woodlines (if conditions are wet, remain on formed roads only).

Goongarrie Conservation Reserve and National Park

Goongarrie is in the transition zone between the Coolgardie and Murchison biogeographical regions.

Where is it: 90 kilometres north of Kalgoorlie.

Facilities: Goongarrie homestead complex has accommodation in buildings and full facilities. All the buildings have tables, wood BBQs, water supply, rainwater, showers, some furniture, and provisions for electricity (BYO generator).

Camping fees apply and bookings can be made through the DPAW Kalgoorlie Office.

What to do: 4WD trips, touring, history, bushwalking along a marked 5 kilometres trail, birdwatching, cycling, camping and nature study.

Jaurdi Conservation Reserve

Once a sheep station, today Jaurdi is a conservation reserve boasting a number of flora and fauna species including birds, native mammals, reptiles and frogs.

Where is it: 175 kilometres west of Kalgoorlie via the Great Eastern Highway and Ryan's Find on Mt Walton Road.

Facilities: The homestead, just north of the railway, has basic accommodation, running water, a shower, toilet, pot belly stove, cooking facilities, tables, barbecue, rain and dam water tanks, shearers' quarters and a shearing shed. Camping fees apply and bookings can be made through the DPAW Kalgoorlie Office.

What to do: Sightseeing, walking, photography, nature study, camping, environmental education, 4WD trips, yabbies in the dams.

Rowles Lagoon Conservation Park

Where is it: 73 kilometres north of Coolgardie along the Bonnie Vale and Carbine Roads or alternatively from Kalgoorlie via Ora Banda.

Facilities: Information shelter, tables, toilets, camping sites, freshwater lake, boat-launching site, gazetted water ski area, heritage trail.

What to do: Sightseeing, walking, photography, nature observation (especially bird watching), swimming, water-skiing, canoeing, picnics, camping.

RENT A CAR AND EXPLORE THE GOLDFIELDS

Taking to the road in the Goldfields is an exhilarating experience. There's so much to discover that it can be difficult to decide where to start. If you've arrived in Kalgoorlie-Boulder by train or plane, an excellent way to experience the heart of this region is by hiring a car.

Begin your self drive adventure in 'Kal' itself, and make sure you visit attractions such as the KCGM Super Pit, the marvellous renovated streetscape along Burt Street, Boulder and drive out to the Mt Charlotte Lookout for beautiful views of the city and surrounds and then continue on to Hannans North Tourist Mine.

There are numerous other self drive trails that can be taken from Kalgoorlie like the 965km Golden Quest Discovery Trail, the Green Trail or perhaps take a drive and play outback golf along part of the Nullarbor Links starting at the world standard Kalgoorlie Golf Course and perhaps playing the Kambalda, Norseman and Fraser Range holes before returning to Kalgoorlie. Any journey in the outback takes you past historic towns, abandoned mines, historical sites and nature reserves.

EVENTS IN KALGOORLIE-BOULDER

Kalgoorlie is the home of major events in the region. The Kalgoorlie Racing Round is a highlight of the social calendar and the Diggers and Dealers conference is the biggest mining get together in the Southern Hemisphere. For family fun don't forget the St Barbara's Festival street parade.

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


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COOLGARDIE



557km east of Perth

The name Coolgardie is said to be derived from the Aboriginal word 'Coolcaby', which refers to the area's mulga vegetation and gnamma waterholes. Over the years, Coolgardie has been known by various names such as Bayley's Find, Fly Flat, The Old Camp and The Old Diggings.

When stopping in Coolgardie, be sure to download the new walking trail app 'Glory Days', available as a free download from Apple iTunes and Google Play. The app will take you on a journey back through history to the busiest days of Coolgardie as you walk up and down Bayley Street.

PLACES OF INTEREST

Lions Lookout

The view Bayley and Ford first saw in 1892 as they rode in from Gnarlbine Soak looking over to where they first struck gold – the area they soon called Fly Flat. A picnic and BBQ area is available.

Ben Prior's Park

An intriguing open air museum featuring interesting items of days gone by. Stop in to have a look at the old Police Cart, Night Cart and one of the smallest banks (not operating) built in 1892.

Historic Cemeteries

Much of Coolgardie's history can be read on the headstones of the Pioneer Cemetery and the Coolgardie Cemetery. As typhoid hit the town in the early gold rush days, many people died without their identity being recorded.

Goldfields Exhibition Museum

Housed in the historical Warden's Court Building (built 1898). Each room features fascinating displays telling the dramatic and tragic story of life in and around Coolgardie

during the gold rush of the 1890s. Also housed in the museum is the Modesto Varischetti mine rescue story, the famous Waghorn collection and the Pharmacy display.

Warden Finnerty's Residence

A beautiful old house built in 1895 of local stone, for the first Mining Warden and Resident Magistrate, John Michael Finnerty.

KAMBALDA



651km east of Perth

Visit Australia's first nickel township established in 1897 as a gold mining town during the gold rush frenzy, but was virtually deserted by 1908. The town came alive again during the 1960s with the discovery of one of the world's largest nickel sulphide deposits and the opening of Australia's Golden Outback's first nickel mine known as St Ives Kambalda.

PLACES OF INTEREST

Kambalda Memorial Garden

A memorial dedicated to the men who accidentally lost their lives whilst working on mines around Kambalda, as well as the hundreds of men who died from illnesses attributed to mining. The garden features a shady gazebo surrounded by native plants and roses.

Red Hill Lookout

Visit Red Hill which overlooks Lake Lefroy and active mining operations. The bush trails take you around the hill, showcasing some mining history and rare flora and fauna.

Nullarbor Links

Play the par 4 Silver Lake hole of the world's longest golf course. The hole is named after Lake Lefroy and the tee box is dedicated to Kevin Higgins.

MENZIES

724km north-east of Perth
130km north of Kalgoorlie

Site 6: Golden Quest Discovery Trail. Named after early prospector Leslie Robert Menzies, Menzies is not a large town, but this was not always the case. Like many towns in Western Australia it boomed during the gold rush days of the 1890s. Then, like many gold mining towns, resources were exhausted, people drifted away, and the area declined.

Despite these changing fortunes, Menzies has had its ups and downs, but is again beginning to prosper. At its peak, Menzies boasted a population of 5,000 residents with 13 hotels, 3 banks, its own breweries and cordial factories, a post office with a staff of 25, a school with 205 pupils, a public library and four churches.

The main industries of Menzies today are tourism, prospecting, pastoral, and some larger mining activities.

PLACES OF INTEREST

Lady Shenton Hotel Building

The Lady Shenton Hotel Building operated as a hotel from 1902 to 1922 and has served various functions over the years. This recently restored building now houses the Menzies Visitor Centre, the Public Library, the Community Resource Centre, the Community Postal Agency and a History/Heritage Room.

Adjacent to the Lady Shenton Hotel Building is the conveniently located Menzies Caravan Park.

Town Hall and Clock Tower

The first section was built in 1896. In 1900/01 the building was extended to include council chambers, administration offices, public library and reading room with a Town Hall located at the rear of the building.

Menzies waited a hundred years before a clock was installed in the clock tower in 2000. It is still the administration centre for the Shire

and the Town Hall regularly hosts community events and activities. Facilities in the Town Hall precinct include: free gas BBQ, picnic tables, children's playground, multipurpose courts, public toilets, town oval and newly installed water park.

Menzies Cemetery

Site 7: Golden Quest Discovery Trail. Discover the graves of pioneers and children and learn of their lives as you wander through this amazing site. Menzies Cemetery is distinctive for the number of galvanized iron monuments which are skillfully shaped and scrolled by the early tinsmiths making use of available material.

Historic Buildings

The railway station built in 1898, is a substantial brick federation building and the last railway station remaining on the Northern Goldfields railway line.

Other historic buildings include the 'Old' Menzies Hotel, Post Office, Tearooms & Butcher's Shop, Pioneer Store and the current Menzies Hotel which is a friendly outback pub and a place to enjoy a drink, have a meal and stay the night.

Tjuntjuntjara Community in the Great Victoria Desert

700km east of Menzies near the South Australian border, the Spinifex people through their art present the traditional culture of Spinifex lands and lore.

The Spinifex Arts Project is a collective community based initiative which has produced both major collaborative and singular works which show the complexities of knowledge and relationship to country.

Lake Ballard

The iconic 'Inside Australia' exhibition is located 51 kilometres west of Menzies. See the 51 sculptures by internationally renowned artist Antony Gormley, which are mostly derived from laser scans of the residents of Menzies. Free camping, toilets and picnic facilities available and a black water dump station.

KOOKYNIIE

70km north-east of Menzies

Site 9: Golden Quest Discovery Trail. In 1903 Kookynie was a thriving township of more than 400 buildings and 2,500 people. It had seven hotels, two newspapers and a range of stores. Now a 'Living Ghost Town' Kookynie's stories are interpreted at the Visitor Information Bay.

From here visit many historical sites such as the ruins of the Cosmopolitan Hotel, the Cosmopolitan mine site, the cemetery and the Grand Hotel - a real outback pub with cold beer and comfortable accommodation.

Niagara 'Ghost Town'

Little is left of the town but a few relics and a historic cemetery. Niagara was a prosperous town before Kookynie was established and declined when richer gold was found close by.

Niagara Dam

Site 8: Golden Quest Discovery Trail. Completed in 1898 by the WA Railways Dept. to provide water for the steam loco's operating on the Kalgoorlie-Menzies line.

Niagara Dam has spent the last 100 years serving as a picnic and swimming spot. Free camping facilities, including shady sites, gas BBQ, picnic tables, toilets and a black water dump point. There are cement fire rings, own wood required.

Two walk trails one Round-the-Dam Trail and the Breakaway Trail show the contrast of the man-made and natural attractions at this scenic site.

LEONORA

831km north-east of Perth

Leonora, with its wide main street and numerous historic buildings, is a main regional centre in the Northern Goldfields. Leonora's history dates back to 1869 when explorer John Forrest and his party, in search of the lost Leichhardt Expedition, made camp near a hill and named it Mount Leonora. Twenty five years on, prospectors moved through the area, and by 1896 mining claims were pegged and gold discovered, leading to the establishment of Leonora and Gwalia, along with the smaller town of Malcolm.

Leonora became the largest centre on the north-eastern Goldfields and by 1908 boasted seven hotels, general stores, a chemist, tailors and bakeries. Mining has continued through to the present day with gold and nickel being produced in large quantities.

Today, Leonora features quality services and facilities for travellers including a supermarket and general stores, service stations, dining facilities, recreation and aquatic centre, caravan park, motels, hotel and village style accommodation.

PLACES OF INTEREST

Heritage Buildings

The Leonora Heritage Trail highlights 30 historic buildings and sites dating back to 1896 when the town of Leonora was first established. The trail can be navigated using an online interactive trail map available for free download from www.leonora.wa.gov.au/tourism-and-leisure/leonora-heritage-trail.aspx

Tank Hill

A panoramic view of the town and surrounds can be obtained from the top of Tank Hill.

Malcolm Dam

Located 12 kilometres from Leonora, Malcolm Dam was built in 1902 to provide water for the railway. Today, this dam is a haven for birds.

The Terraces

A large breakaway formation about 40 kilometres north to north-east of Leonora, provides good bushwalking and some magnificent views.

The Leonora Loop Trails

A great way to see the sights, and soak up the stories of the Leonora Shire. The Leonora Loop Trails are two self-drive trails, with two very different themes; the Agnew Loop takes you through the social history of the area that was hot, harsh and unforgiving, while the Darlot Loop sees you travel through the varied natural landscapes of the north-eastern Goldfields. Each trail has 15 interpretive sites, along with a rusty steel storyteller structure waiting to share a story with you. A comprehensive and entertaining 90-page guidebook is available from a range of Visitor Centres around the Goldfields.

commissioned in 1898 by Herbert Hoover, who later became the 31st President of the United States of America. The house now serves as Hoover House B&B where guest can overnight.

Gwalia can claim to have once been the second largest gold mine in Western Australia, to have the first state hotel and second public swimming pool built and today has Australia's only remaining timber incline headframe.

Gwalia Ghost Town App

LEINSTER

970km north-east of Perth

Leinster is often described as an oasis in the desert. Residents refer to the town as either the 'home of the wedge tailed eagle' or 'the jewel of the Northern Goldfields'. Leinster takes its name from the nearby Leinster Downs Station. The town was first established in 1976 as a company town supporting the nickel mine of the Agnew Gold Mining Company. Prior to mining activities, it was pastoral land.

GWALIA

Gwalia Ghost Town and Museum

Gwalia, only 3 kilometres south from Leonora, is a truly fascinating living ghost town. Wandering through the abandoned miners' cottages provide a snapshot of a way of life associated with the Sons of Gwalia goldmine (1896-1963). The mine manager's house was

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

LAVERTON



955km north-east of Perth

Named after Dr Charles Laver, a keen prospector who rode his bicycle from Coolgardie to this area, and backed many prospectors who went to him with likely propositions.

From the very beginning, Laverton developed as the centre for commercial and social activity. Laverton is at the western end of the Great Central Road, which forms part of the Outback Way - Australia's third strategic link. Laverton features a range of accommodation options including a caravan park, hotel and motel. Laverton also has a supermarket, service station and sports club.

PLACES OF INTEREST

The Great Beyond Explorers' Hall of Fame

Complementing the rich visual history of the Northern Goldfields, the Great Beyond Explorers' Hall of Fame utilises cutting edge technology to bring to life the characters and stories of the past.

Step back in time with several notable explorers who led challenging expeditions through Central Australia during the mid to late 19th century as they recount their stories of hardship and bravery. Discover what it was like for women and pioneers living and working on the Goldfields during the pioneer days and

learn about the valuable industries that sustain our inland.

The Great Beyond Hall of Fame also houses a gift shop, café and the local Visitor Centre.

Windarra Mine Site Lookout

Located 28 kilometres from Laverton, this is the site of the Windarra Nickel Mine, made famous during the Poseidon Nickel Boom. The lookout provides panoramic views over the famous site and its main mining structures that remain standing.

Lonely Bush Graves

Situated approximately 20km from Laverton, all that remains of the infamous Burtville townsite is the resting place of some of our early prospectors and miners.

All except one of the deceased laid to rest at the cemetery were victims of the harsh and volatile conditions in the Goldfields early gold rush and mining period.

Site 12 of the Golden Quest Discovery Trail takes you to the grave of John Aspinall, a young New Zealand prospector whose quest to find gold came to a tragic and lonely end when he was struck by lightning in March 1896.

A little further down the road at Mt Morgans, the picturesque cemetery is well worth the visit. Disease, accident, suicide and murder were common causes of death as can be seen on numerous headstones. The Mt Morgans Cemetery is approximately 50km from Laverton.

Golden Quest Discovery Trail (Site 13)

Laverton is the northernmost site on the Golden Quest Discovery Trail. Other sites close to Laverton include Mt Morgans, Hawks Nest and Murrin Murrin.

Laverton Outback Gallery

The Gallery is located in the LLCCA building next to the hotel. There is a wide range of Indigenous art on display and for sale.

Billy Goat Hill Lookout

Situated at the top of Hawks Place, near the water tank. Panoramic views over the township and beyond.

Old Police Precinct

Within the Precinct are the original Police Sergeant's house, the Police office and the gaol, all of which have been extensively refurbished in recent years.

The buildings are open from 11am - 1pm daily or by appointment. Contact the Great Beyond Visitor Centre on (08) 9031 1361.

WILUNA



966km north-east of Perth

The Shire of Wiluna covers an area of 184,000 square kilometres and is predominately mining, pastoral and native title land, including Indigenous Protected Areas at Matuwa (Lorna Glen Station), Kurrara-kurrara and Birriliburu.

The town of Wiluna is on the edge of the Little Sandy Desert, located east of Meekatharra (unsealed) and north of Leinster (sealed), on the Goldfields Highway. It's the gateway to the Canning Stock Route which runs north to Halls Creek, and the Gunbarrel Highway that runs east to Alice Springs. Good fuel and grocery outlets are available in Wiluna.

PLACES OF INTEREST

Historical Buildings

The Wiluna Shire Offices were formerly the town hospital where the retired Governor General Sir Michael Jeffrey was born.

Tjukurba Art Gallery and Tourist Information

The Tjukurba Art Gallery offers visitors a sample of unique and affordable paintings by the Birriliburu artists, some of whose works have been exhibited overseas. The Gallery and tourist information centre are located in the historic hospital (Shire office).

Statues of Warri and Yatungka

Be sure to visit the town's statue 'Last of the Nomads' and read the plaque to learn of the beautiful love story behind their culturally frowned-upon relationship. Their deaths marked the end of a tribal lifestyle that has stretched back more than 40,000 years. Not to be missed!

Clay Pans

These fill with water at different times of year and are great for windsurfing, canoeing, bird watching and picnics.

Pioneer Cemetery

19 grave sites identified from Shire records dating from 1893 to 1903 when the cemetery was moved because of periodic flooding in the area first chosen.

Gunbarrel Highway

The Gunbarrel is a popular four wheel drive which takes you across the ranges and central desert to Warburton and Alice Springs.

Matuwa - Lorna Glen Reserve

150 kilometres north east of Wiluna, an historic cattle station owned by Tarlka Matuwa Piarku Aboriginal Corporation and jointly managed with Dept. Parks & Wildlife. Matuwa is home to a nationally significant ecological restoration program including the reintroduction of a range of threatened species.

Canning Stock Route (CSR)

Well numbers 1 and 2 are close to the town, as are the original cattle loading yards. The turn off for Well number 1 is located 3.8km north of town on Neds Creek Road and then 3.5km to the west. Well No. 2 is located approximately 39km to the north, also along Neds Creek Road and then to the east along the CSR track. Exploring to various parts (or all) of the track between Wiluna and Halls Creek is popular in the cooler months of the year.

Lake Violet

Located near the township of Wiluna, this lake can host hundreds of black swans over the winter months.

North Pool

North Pool is located on the Canning Stock Route. Both North Pool and Lake Violet are pleasant spots for a picnic and are fantastic for bird watching. Like many other features these are within 20 kilometres of town.



SHIRE OF NGAANYATJARRAKU



1,542km north-east of Perth
550km north-east of Laverton

The Shire of Ngaanyatjaraku encompasses an area of 159,948 square kilometres, making it the fourth largest Local Government by geographic area in Western Australia. The region itself is diverse in natural beauty from the magnificent Rawlinson Ranges to the red sandy plains of the Gibson and Great Victoria Deserts.

The distinctive red sand and blue skies of the area form a spectacular context for a diverse array of desert rangelands and arid zone flora and fauna. Rocky escarpments and other landforms give texture to this beautiful country.

The Shire is home to ten Indigenous communities scattered throughout the district with a total population of approximately 1,650 people, with the main regional centre being Warburton which is situated on the Great Central Road. The Shire offices are located here at the Tjulyuru Cultural and Civic Centre.

The Great Central Road forms the main thoroughfare for the Shire of Ngaanyatjaraku. It is part of the 'Outback Way', a 2,800km trans-national link stretching from Laverton in Western Australia to Winton in Queensland. The Outback Way passes through some of Australia's most spectacular outback country, including the Uluru-Kata Tjuta National Park.

PLACES OF INTEREST

The Outback Way

Driving the Great Central Road section of the Outback Way and traversing the middle of the Shire is a great eco-tourism experience, passing through the Rawlinson Ranges, Walter James Ranges, and Gill's Pinnacle. Other sites of note along the way are Len Beadell's Tree, the Giles Meteorological Station, and the Tjulyuru Cultural and Civic Centre which displays some of the finest Indigenous art works in Australia and is home to the world-renowned Warburton Arts Project.

Break up your journey through spectacular sunsets and bright red sand with visits to these attractions:

Tjulyuru Cultural and Civic Centre, Warburton

The Tjulyuru Cultural Centre complex is a civic and cultural hub for visitors and locals based at the Warburton Community on the Great Central Road. Visitors to the area are encouraged to visit the Tjulyuru Regional Arts Gallery and check out the arts, crafts and publications for sale at the Warta Shop. Tjulyuru Regional Arts Gallery exhibitions draw from contemporary Ngaanyatjarra art practice in the region and the Warburton Art Collection - reputedly the world's largest collection of community-owned and controlled Aboriginal art.

Giles Weather Station, Warakurna

The Giles Weather Station (established 1956) is a fully functioning meteorological observation station based at Warakurna Community. Visitors can schedule a tour of the station and view the daily release of the observation balloon.

Yarla Kutjarra (rest stop)

The Yarla Kutjarra wayside stop between Warburton and Warakurna has been provided by the Ngaanyatjarra people as a place where visitors can camp and enjoy the peace and tranquillity of the Ngaanyatjarra Lands without disturbing any of the culturally significant places along the Great Central Road. Signage at the site provides information about the area.

Surveyor General's Corner

The intersection of the borders of the Northern Territory and the states South Australia and Western Australia is known as the Surveyor General's Corner. Access to the area is limited to guided tours and visitors require a special permit.


Local Roadhouses

Roadhouses form vital sources of water, fuel, food and accommodation along the Great Central Road. Two Roadhouses operate in the Shire of Ngaanyatjaraku - Warburton Roadhouse and Warakurna Roadhouse. Both facilities operate 7 days per week and offer fuel, fast food and supplies, and motel or campground accommodation for travellers.

Top things to see

If you dream of a real Australian outback adventure, look no further than the extraordinary Gascoyne-Murchison region, with Mount Augustus - Australia's largest rock, rich red earth, rugged ranges, ancient rock features, vast sheep and cattle stations, Aboriginal culture and awesome drive trails.

Everything is big here. The giant Mount Augustus looms above its surrounding landscape, twice the size of Uluru (Ayers Rock), and stands majestically as the largest rock in the world. The monolith red rock is shrouded in Aboriginal mythology and echoed in carvings, believed to be pre-Dreamtime.

Similarly spectacular landscape is evident at the Kennedy Range National Park. This huge elevation of breathtaking cliff face, gorge and rock is between 10 kilometres and 25 kilometres wide and covers 75 kilometres in a north-south direction.

The Gascoyne-Murchison region is also home to vast cattle and sheep stations, established with pioneering spirit that refused to give

in to some of the most unforgiving land on earth, where water is scarce and survival is a challenge. A network of these cattle and sheep stations welcomes guests to stay and a chance to experience the unique lifestyle. They offer a range of accommodation including homesteads, self-contained cottages, shearers quarters, caravan and camp sites and even sleeping in a swag under the brilliant star-filled sky. In this extensive region, the night skies are clear, bright and endless.

This outback area is dotted with dozens of tiny, character-filled towns, each showing a distinctive personality that has contributed to their survival.

In the wildflower season, the region is a riot of colour as the rains bring forth a blanket of wildflowers that stretch as far as the eye can see. The Murchison is particularly well-known for its stunning carpets of everlastings that cover entire fields in pinks, whites and yellows.

One of the best ways to explore the Gascoyne-Murchison is by following one or more of the Outback Pathways. These self drive pathways criss-cross the region and showcase the many natural wonders of this magical landscape.

Wildflowers: The Gascoyne-Murchison is renowned for its carpets of everlastings that colour the region from mid July to mid/late September each year. As wildflowers are dependent on seasonal rains, it is advisable to secure wildflower touring information prior to departure.

Designed in 1920 by the famous priest and architect Monsignor Hawes for the Dominican Sisters who were based in Yalgoo.

White, cream, yellow and pink everlastings are prolific in the Yalgoo Shire from late July to early September.

MURCHISON SETTLEMENT

738km north of Perth

Where the outback begins. It doesn't get any more outback than the Shire of Murchison. 'The Shire without a town' is home to sprawling pastoral stations, abundant wildlife, and seasonal wildflower displays, yet very few people. The Shire covers an area of 49,500 square kilometres with a population of just 121.

The hub of the Shire is the Murchison Settlement, home to around 20 people. All the Council infrastructure is located in the Settlement including Council offices and depot, staff housing, the roadhouse, sporting facilities, museum and power and water supply.

Murchison Shire is also the home of the Australian Square Kilometre Array Pathfinder (ASKAP) and Murchison Radio-astronomy Observatory site (MRO). The purpose of the ASKAP/MRO is to provide a world-leading survey radio telescope to explore the history of the universe. The MRO is operated by CSIRO as a restricted site and is not open to visitors.

PLACES OF INTEREST

Murchison Settlement

Be at one with nature on the newly upgraded rangeland botanical walk or view the many artefacts of pastoral and indigenous life at the Murchison Museum. Go bird watching, enjoy the sunsets, gaze at the amazing night sky or just boost the population for a day.

Murchison Oasis Roadhouse & Caravan Park

Located at the Murchison Settlement the roadhouse, which incorporates motel style accommodation and a first class caravan park, providing visitor needs with tourist information, shady trees, grass and modern facilities. Shop, great food and 24 hour eftpos fuel available.

Errabiddy Bluff and Outcamp

Located 15 kilometres west of the settlement, Errabiddy Bluff's large rock formations make a significant mark on the landscape. Ideal for a day trip and a picnic or BBQ. The magnificent sunsets seen from the bluff are a prelude to a display of stars you never thought existed.

Bilung Pool and Wooramel River Gorges

On the Carnarvon-Mullewa Road, discover the tranquil waters and enjoy a picnic at Bilung Pool. While you're there be sure to take in the Wooramel River Gorges, a spectacular example of an inland river system.

Old Stock Well

55 kilometres south of Murchison Settlement on the Carnarvon-Mullewa Road, this recently restored well was once used by drovers moving stock. A picnic area with barbecue is now available for visitors making it a great place to stop off and take in the vast history of the area.

Ballinyoo Bridge

Further south, the oldest concrete bridge in Western Australia has been replaced with a new bridge, but a span of the original Ballinyoo Bridge has been preserved as an historic marker of its former glory.

Wildlife and Wildflowers

Kangaroos, emus, majestic eagles, red-tail black cockatoos and many amazing reptile species. Seasonal rain can bring fields of everlasting and other rangeland natives.

Experience true station life, discover indigenous rock art or soak in the outback atmosphere at the various station stays throughout the Shire.

GASCOYNE JUNCTION



1,069km north of Perth

Nature, humanity and time meet at the intersection that is the Gascoyne Junction – it's where the ancient Lyons and Gascoyne Rivers join up, and where the stock routes of the past overlapped.

As well, it is a place where the land still gives a clear view of life on earth millions of years ago. The abundant fossil beds, and unmistakable evidence of vast oceans of the distant past paint a fascinating picture.

A Mighty River

The Gascoyne River flows for 760 kilometres from the Western Desert to the Indian Ocean at Carnarvon.

The Mighty Gascoyne is known as the 'upside-down river' because most of its water is beneath the surface. Along its path the river surfaces, keeping people and animals alive during the scorching summer heat. The river also provides a wonderful habitat for the many species of birds that flock here all year round.

Respecting People and Country

Visitors are advised to leave all rocks, stones, water holes, hills and ranges, exactly as you found them. You should be mindful that there are places here that are powerful and sacred to the original occupiers, and may not be visible to the casual observer.

Roads Less-Travelled

With around 1,800 kilometres of unsealed road, there is plenty of opportunity to explore the country. Amongst the wildlife you'll encounter are cattle, goats, sheep, horses, kangaroos, emus, wild turkeys, bungarras, dingoes, a vast variety of birds, and the occasional vehicle as well.

The roads are generally in very good condition, but it's always wise to bring a couple of spare tyres, and plenty of water.

Geology

200-300 million years ago most of the area was underwater, and sea-life fossils are common around the area. A fault zone 10 kilometres wide is just north of the Errabiddy homestead. What takes the eye most is the types and colours of precious and semi-precious stones which are so attractive.

PLACES OF INTEREST

Junction Pub and Tourist Park

Following the devastation of the December 2010 Gascoyne River flood, the Junction Hotel has been replaced. Now you will find a state of the art facility including a roadhouse with 24 hour Eftpos fuel sales; tavern and caravan park with onsite cabins, ensuite van sites, van sites and grassed camp sites. The facility also has two children's playgrounds. Stop in for a well-earned break and relax with a cool drink in the beer garden.

The Yarning Spot, Cattle Pool

Yarning Spot is to the north of the Gascoyne River at the Junction, and Cattle Pool is on the Lyons River near Cobra. The prolific and ever-changing bird life congregate here. Ornithologists have counted over 128 species of bird-life in the Gascoyne and the sights and sounds of these birds are truly wonderful.

Kennedy Range National Park

This is a truly awesome place to visit with many places to walk to and explore such as Honeycomb Gorge. During July to September you may be lucky enough to witness the colonies of the unique Dawson's Burrowing Bees.

Mt Augustus National Park

Mt Augustus is the largest monolith in the world, bigger than Uluru. However, the vegetation on the Mount is deceptive. Colours and hues change throughout the day, and make this a spectacular sight. A walk to the top is achievable and very rewarding.

Gascoyne Junction Community Resource Centre

Gascoyne Junction CRC offers a wide range of services including tourist information, public library, internet café, postal agency, Centrelink agent, Dept of Transport Licencing agent. Local postcards and gifts also available for purchase.

EVENTS

Gascoyne in May

Gascoyne in May consists of five festivals held on consecutive weekends in May across the Gascoyne region. Upper Gascoyne's River Music Festival brings people from near and far for a great weekend of fun and entertainment, so pack your camping gear and head on out. The Junction Races

A bush race meeting held each August, where there are as many genuine characters as there are racehorses. The Racecourse is 10 kilometres west of the Junction, bring your caravan, tent or swag and camp out.



World renowned NATIONAL PARKS

Kennedy Range and Mount Augustus National Parks are some of the most ancient landforms in Australia. These are must see destinations.

Kennedy Range 250 million years ago was a shallow ocean basin off the edge of the Australian continent. It filled with sediment which compressed to form layers of sandstone and shale. Movements in the earth's crust brought these above sea level and today marine fossils can be found in the range's sandstone strata. Mount Augustus is an asymmetrical anticline, consisting of sand and gravel folded in an arch-like structure, deposited by an ancient river system that drained the region 1,600 million years ago. Water should be taken and vehicles should be in sound condition. Avoid walking in the hottest part of the day.

MT AUGUSTUS NATIONAL PARK

At about twice the size of Ayers Rock, it is the biggest rock in the world. Known by the local Wajjari Aboriginal people as Burringurrah, it rises spectacularly over the surrounding plain, and at 750 metres, is visible for more than 160 kilometres.

Interesting rock formations, caves and Aboriginal engravings are found on many parts of the rock that have been untouched for thousands of years. Emu Hill Lookout is a good location from which to take wonderful sunset photographs of the mount.

There are many things to see and do around Mount Augustus. Burringurrah Drive is a 49 kilometre circuit providing views of the changing faces of the rock, and giving you access to all feature sites. The drive is suitable for conventional two wheel drive vehicles.

KENNEDY RANGE NATIONAL PARK

Kennedy Range National Park offers spectacular scenery of gorges and precipitous faces, with a vast plateau of ancient dunefields on top of the range. Lying roughly 150kms east of Carnarvon, the area retains a wilderness feeling, with camping beneath the stark sandstone cliffs.

The Aboriginal Inggarda name for the range is Mundoo Thuda. Artefacts found in the park provide evidence of the long history Aboriginal people have with the area.

Best time to visit is August through September, when wildflowers are in full bloom, changing the landscape into a mass of colour. The developed visitor sites lie on the eastern side of the range and can be accessed by the Ullawarra Road north of Gascoyne Junction.

SANDSTONE



725km north-east of Perth

Lying in the heart of the spectacular lower Murchison district, Sandstone's bronzed landscape contains many unique and picturesque locations. Throughout the area, natural rock formations or breakaways contrast dramatically with the rust stained landscape.

Gold was first discovered in the immediate Sandstone area as early as 1894 and remains a popular spot for the casual gold prospector. From 1906 Sandstone grew to a small city of some 3,000 people. By the end of the 1920s only 200 people remained. Fortunately Sandstone has survived and today makes an ideal stopover at the centre of some of Western Australia's great tourist routes.

Sandstone offers the traveller a 24/7 fuel service (diesel and unleaded petrol) and a range of accommodation facilities with a hotel, accommodation units and caravan park. The very popular 40 powered bay Alice Atkinson Caravan Park is centrally located in the town and is open all year round. For enquiries telephone (08) 9963 5859 or stay@sandstone.wa.gov.au

PLACES OF INTEREST

Sandstone Heritage Trail

This 18km drive trail features locations of historical and natural significance. Don't miss the breakaway that housed the Old Brewery. Photograph London Bridge, the natural basalt formation which is over 350 million years old. The Trail also includes the former State Battery, Contradiction Well and the public cemetery.

Sandstone Heritage Town Walk

The Post and Telegraph Office was built in 1909. Some of the sites you will see on the town walk include the old and new Shire Office buildings, the Black Range Chapel, Heritage Cottage, Gold and Wool Interpretive Park and former School (the original Courthouse). The Police Lock-up and the Water Park are favourites on this easy stroll about town.

National Hotel

The National Hotel is the last and smallest of four hotels built during the gold rush years, and the only one still standing. As the township shrank in the 1920s, the hotel became a hub of activity for Sandstone. Now providing accommodation, bar, meals and the shop for the town, today it's still a great place to meet some of the locals.

Breakaway Country

Just over 30km east of Sandstone, on the way to Leinster, is the Peter Denny Lookout featuring stunning views, fire rings and picnic tables.

Sandstone Night Sky

Witness some truly spectacular sunsets. Sandstone is an amazing place to experience the glory of the night sky. The darkness of the outback sky and clear atmosphere make it a brilliant location to stargaze. The Shire is installing a telescope system that will be available for visitors' use.

Wildflowers

Subject to seasonal rain, Sandstone is transformed from red earth to a carpet of colour from late July to mid-September. Be sure to contact the Visitor Information Centre to check on availability of wildflowers and best viewing locations.

Golf Course

Visitors can play a round on the town's unique 18-hole golf course. Clubs available for hire from the Sandstone Visitor Centre.

649km north of Perth

Known as 'Queen of the Murchison' because of its importance in the gold production of the area it once boasted a population of around 10,000. Cue makes a fascinating starting point to explore the Murchison and Goldfields regions of Western Australia.

As legend has it, Cue came about thanks to a gold find by prospector Mick Fitzgerald who, having spotted an Aboriginal fellow called 'Governor' with a 10 ounce nugget around his neck, enquired where he had found the nugget, and he was then led to a quartz hill bearing gold in Cue's centre on New Year's Day in 1892. The quartz blow is still visible today, located behind the Fire Station.

Cue is ready to delight tourists with attractions ranging from 19th century buildings to 10,000 year old Aboriginal rock art. If you are planning on including Cue in your outback adventure make sure to take advantage and undertake one of the following trails:

Heritage Walk Trail

2.7kms takes in 13 key historic sites and buildings.

Heritage Town Trail

13kms includes Day Dawn, Great Fingall Mine Office, Old Hospital Ruins, Old Cemetery.

Heritage & Tourist Drive Trail

45kms+ includes Walga Rock, Big Bell, Nallan Lake Reserve, Reedy townsite, Lake Austin, Berring Pool, Afghan Rock, Garden Granites, Dalgarranga Meteorite Crater, Poona Old Emerald Mine and many others.

PLACES OF INTEREST

Aboriginal Art – Walga Rock

A huge granite monolith known as Walga Rock, situated 48kms west of Cue, is a site of deep Aboriginal cultural and spiritual significance. The most unusual art depicts a sailing ship in white ochre with masts, rigging and portholes.

The Cue Historical Photograph Collection

Step back in time to the wild gold rush days of Cue's past with a journey among the collection of historical photos on display in the Cue Shire Administration Building, built in 1895 and was once home to the London and Western Australian Investment Company offices, and later the Gentlemen's Club.

Nallan Lake

Nallan Lake is a nature reserve and during periods of heavy winter rains transforms into a favoured picnic spot.

Milly Soak

Milly Soak is located 16 kilometres north of Cue and was a popular picnic spot in Cue's early history. It was also the town's first water supply.

Government Buildings

The government buildings are situated in the main street and were built between 1895 and 1897 from locally quarried limestone. The buildings were, and remain, among the most impressive in the region.

Old Cemetery

About 4kms east along the Sandstone Road, view a cluster of graves from the late 1890s. It is thought that 9 graves were moved here from their original burial sites in 1897, to make way for the railway station.

Old Gaol

Located in the Cue Tourist Park was built in 1896 and was a temporary home to prisoners being transported from outback lock ups in the north until its official closure in 1914.

The Old Municipal Chambers

This building in Robinson Street was opened in 1896, and the Shire conducted its first meeting here, used until 1980. It is now home to the Cue District Visitor Centre and Community Resource Centre.

Masonic Lodge

Built in 1899 from timber and galvanised iron, and is said to be the biggest free standing, double story corrugated iron construction in the southern hemisphere, is subject to many a ghost story!

Cue Hospital Ruins

The hospital served the old Day Dawn township and started as a canvas and bough shed in July 1892. In 1895 a more sturdy structure was built from local stone. Today several walls from this building remain, as does the ruins of the chimney from the hospital's crematorium.

Great Fingal Mine

The Great Fingal Mine Site Office is another turn of the century structure that is a truly magnificent example of the buildings of this period. Interestingly Herbert Hoover, President of the USA, worked in this building.

Big Bell

The ghost town of Big Bell approximately 30kms north-west of town was gazetted in 1936 and soon after became the terminus of a spur line from the main railway in Cue. The town was deserted by the mid-1950s. The hotel reputedly had the longest bar in Australia and the remains of this once impressive structure are still standing. 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

MEEKATHARRA



764km north of Perth

'There's just something about Meeka,' as the locals like to say - this unique, historic outback goldfields town has lots to offer visitors. Meekatharra is a golden prospect for visitors on their Golden Outback adventure. Situated on the Great Northern Highway, Meekatharra is the largest centre in the Murchison. The town is also home to the Royal Flying Doctor Service, with a regional hospital, GP and visiting dental services, and a chemist in the main street.

Meekatharra was originally a gold prospecting centre and is now a major service centre for local mining and pastoral industries. The town was officially gazetted in 1903 following settlement as a result of the discovery of gold in the region around 1896.

Grand hotels and wide streets pay tribute to the town's rich history. Open-cut mining pits are viewable close to town, and visitors can still try their hand at prospecting, many with surprisingly good results! With rocky outcrops and plenty of native animals, Meekatharra offers many natural attractions too.

If you're into camping, 4x4 and dirt bike adventure, there are plenty of great tracks, scenic spots and places to camp under the stars - once you get off the beaten track, there's a lifetime of amazing places and experiences to discover. Prospecting is very popular, and Meeka has all the services and information you need when you feel the call of 'gold fever'!

PLACES OF INTEREST

Heritage Walk and Drive Trails

Explore Meekatharra's heritage with a range of walk and drive trails. Each trail features interpretive panels with fascinating facts about Indigenous culture, natural wonders and Meekatharra of old. The Meeka Rangelands Discovery Trail is an easy 3 kilometre loop around Meekatharra Creek. The complementary Meeka Town Heritage Walk guides visitors through the present day townsite and showcases Meeka's transition from temporary miners' shacks to impressive stone hotels.

Walk or drive the 900m trail to Meeka Lookout for stunning views over the town and the rich red rangelands extending in every direction. Take a drink or picnic to enjoy while watching an awe inspiring outback sunset.

Venture further afield with the Eastern Loop Drive Trail, a self-guided tour that provides a true 'outback' experience. Don't miss the stockyards, State Battery remains, Paddy's Flat, and the Royal Flying Doctor Service.

Meekatharra Museum

Located in the library in the Shire building, the museum contains a large collection of photographs, prints and historic memorabilia showcasing Meekatharra's past. All items have been donated by residents looking to preserve local heritage.

State Battery

The State Battery on Main Street acknowledges the early prospectors and miners who followed them. It stands proudly along Meekatharra Creek along with other interesting relics from Meekatharra's gold mining past.

Gold Mining Pits and Prospecting

Meekatharra echoes with the district's rich gold mining heritage. Disused and operational open cut mining pits provide a fascinating and spectacular site. Many prospecting sites around the town still yield regular finds. Visit the Mining Registrar's Office on Savage Street to arrange your own Prospecting Licence and try your hand at gold mining.

Peace Gorge

Just 3 kilometres west of town, this fascinating area of granite rock formations is an ideal picnic spot. Its reputation for picnics dates back to World War I when Meekatharra's servicemen were welcomed home with a gala picnic and sports day at the granites. Since that day, the area has been known as Peace Gorge.

Royal Flying Doctor Service

Meekatharra's central location makes it the ideal location for the Flying Doctor. The base opened in 1945, taking advantage of the large runway built by the Americans during World War II. Tours of the base can be arranged by contacting RFDS.

Meekatharra Community Resource Centre

Meekatharra CRC services the town with an internet café with Wi-Fi, printing, scanning and free State Government website access. The CRC also displays job opportunities, broadcasts, Westlink TV and delivers the licensing services for the town. Call in and speak to the staff for all your visitor information.

EVENTS



TIPS & TRAVEL INFORMATION

Driving & Other Tips

Self driving through Australia's Golden Outback may take you into some remote areas where forward planning is extremely important to ensure your experience is safe, enjoyable and memorable. The following is a list of safety tips to assist you:

- Always tell someone where you are going, your return dates and your itinerary.
- Make sure your vehicle is in top mechanical condition.
- Check road conditions before departure. Rain can make some tracks and roads impassable. When travelling on unsealed roads, exercise extra caution and 'read' the road well ahead of the vehicle.
- Carry extra food, water, fuel and vehicle spares if you are travelling on remote tracks.
- In event of a breakdown in a remote location, remain with your vehicle.
- The outback can be very hot in summer. Make sure you carry plenty of drinking water.
- Roads and tracks on private property should not be used without the landholder's permission. Leave gates as you found them.
- Take care at all railway crossings not all crossings have flashing lights.
- Large slow-moving agricultural machinery may be encountered on highways and local roads, so take care when overtaking.
- Dust can obscure vision when travelling or passing on dirt roads.
- Beware of wandering livestock and wildlife, especially at dusk and dawn.
- Be prepared! Pack a first-aid kit.
- Slow down on corrugated dirt roads. Drive at a speed suited to the prevailing conditions.
- In remote locations, Visitor Centres, petrol stations and food outlets are open limited hours. Please ring Visitor Centres in advance for further information.
- Plan to travel for no longer than eight or ten hours a day. Take a break every two hours.
- Please dispose of your rubbish properly.
- When visiting national parks and nature reserves don't disturb any animals, plants, Aboriginal relics or landscape features.
- During the warmer months obtain fire danger information, only light fires when permitted in the designated areas. Advice available from local Visitor Centre or DPaW ranger/office.
- Vehicles must keep to formed tracks, avoid driving on unsealed roads in wet conditions.
- Road trains are common and often have up to four trailers travelling max. 100kph. Always leave approximately 200m between vehicles in a

convoy. Only overtake if the road is clear and visible for a long distance ahead.

Please be aware, Telstra Bigpond 3G is the main service provider in the very remote locations, other providers have limited coverage.

Fuel and Food

Food and fuel are generally available every 100 - 300 kms. It is recommended that you plan ahead, some service stations have restricted opening hours and limited bank/credit facilities. LPG Autogas is not available in all regional areas. Contact local Shires or Visitor Centres for fuel availability. In some remote locations fuel is Opal Fuel, which runs in normal engines but is designed to stop substance abuse.

Aboriginal Lands

Permits are essential for travel on Aboriginal Lands. The Outback Way, between Laverton and Uluru, is patrolled and fines will be issued if visitors have not obtained a permit. Permits are also required to traverse sections of the Canning Stock Route, Gunbarrel Highway and Anne Beadell Hwy. Permit application forms in WA are available from the Dept of Aboriginal Affairs www.daa.wa.gov.au. If applying online, approval is almost immediate but other methods of application may take longer to process. If travelling through adjoining lands in other States or Territories, you need to obtain relevant permits from those organisations. Traditional owners can refuse entry permit. When travelling through Aboriginal Lands, drivers are prohibited to divert off the main road, alcohol not allowed to be carried through Aboriginal communities.

Travelling with Pets

Dogs and cats cannot be taken into any WA national parks. Contact caravan parks direct to identify any that may be pet friendly.

WA Quarantine & Inspection Service

WA is free of many pests, weeds and diseases. Protect flora and livestock industries by not bringing fresh fruit, vegetables, plants, flowers, seeds, nuts, honey, used fruit and produce containers, soil, hay and livestock into the state. Checkpoints operate at Border Village for westbound vehicles and Ceduna for eastbound. Contact WA Quarantine and Inspection Service (08) 9334 1800 or agric.wa.gov.au

Gold Prospecting & Fossicking in WA

To prospect you require a Miner's Right. This authorises prospecting on unoccupied crown

land and other areas, subject to conditions. Prospecting cannot be carried out in national parks, nature reserves, on Aboriginal and heritage sites, and within townsites or other classified areas such as cemeteries. Permission is required from the landowner to enter private property (such as farmland). For further information, contact the Department of Mines & Petroleum (08) 9222 3333 or visit dmp.wa.gov.au
